

#### District Governors Report March 4, 2016

We now have completed the Holiday Season that occurred in November, December and January. This was a very busy time for most of the Lions Clubs in this district, and I had the opportunity to participate with a few clubs. Thank you to West Linn, Lake Oswego, and St. Helens Lions clubs for inviting me to celebrate the season with you.

I completed seven more District Governor visitations. I now have only ten more clubs to visit before I will have visited all of the clubs in District 36-O. The Lions of this district are making a significant difference in the lives of the people in our communities. Indeed, where there is a need, there is a Lion.

District 36-O had two clubs dropped due to non-payment of dues to International. The Portland Metro, and the Portland St. John Lions clubs were dropped in January. The Portland Metro Lions Club has already been reinstated and is working on repairing the cause of the non-payment of dues. They also have a net gain of five members. The Portland St. Johns Lions Club is having problems in getting reinstated. They will have to increase membership and pay all back dues.

Our District also had a charter luncheon for the Gales Creek Lions Club. It was a wonderful event with many clubs represented. Thank you to the Beaverton Lions for chartering the Gales Creek Lions Club. The Gales Creek Lions Club is the first Family Lions Club chartered in District 36-0. We in Oregon are moving into the next 100 years of service to our communities.

I also supported District 36-G at there convention by attending in early February. They had a good convention and there were a number of Lion leaders from District 36-O in attendance. Lions are all about supporting others in our community, in our Lions Club, in our state, or around the world. Part of what makes this district, is the willingness to support other lions.

District 36-0 has a net increase in membership this year. At this time we have added 121 new members. 95 new members were added to existing clubs and 26 added with the charter of the Gales Creek Lions Club. Lions in District 36-0 still need to work on retention. We have dropped 117 members and most of them to n-payment of dues and non-attendance to meetings or projects. We need to keep our clubs relevant and meeting the needs of our members in serving their community.

The District 36-O Convention was held on February 20<sup>th</sup> at St. Henry's Catholic Church Gymnasium and was a wonderful success. We had 148 preregistered with 20 first timers attending. Dr. Robert Littlefield and his wife Kathy Littlefield were inspirational with a wonderful opportunity to donate to LCIF for eradicating measles. We also had a great program about "Parrots for Patriots" which is pairing up rescued parrots with Veterans that need a companion.

District 36R Governor's Report Columbia Discovery Center The Dalles, OR March 4, 2016

We are having a very good year in District 36R. We have made progress on most of our goals and expect to successful accomplish most of them by the end of this year. Following are some of the successes during the year.

Women's Symposium: The District 36R Women's Symposium is a reality. It will take place on April 30, 2016. The location will be the Wheeler Pavilion at the Lane County Fairgrounds in Eugene. Our keynote speaker will be Bob Welsh, a retired columnist for the Register-Guard and a well-known author. We will also have Linda Burden-Williams as our luncheon speaker. She has a reputation as an outstanding motivational speaker. We have also had at least twelve organizations and businesses contract for tables at the Symposium. They are paying \$100.00 to have a table which will help to offset some of the costs of the Symposium. In addition, we have received a \$2000.00 grant from LCI. We have already had many women, both Lions and non-Lions, express an interest in attending the Symposium. We hope that the Symposium will provide valuable information for the attendees and that it will enable us to recruit new women Lions members.

Western Oregon Lions Club: We now have nineteen members in the Western Oregon Lions Club. Guiding Lion Steve Moser and I had agreed that we would charter the club as Branch Club of the Central Lions. Since we made that agreement, the club has recruited two additional members with at least two prospective members to be registered. The club has two new service projects scheduled, it has been recognized as an official Campus Club and it continues to work on recruiting new members. I believe we will finally apply for a charter in the near future.

Growth: District 36R is growing. The addition of at least twenty members in the Western Oregon Club and new members brought in several clubs has positioned the District to show growth by the end of the year. I believe we will end the year with positive membership numbers for the first time in six years.

101 on 101 Bike Tour; Planning continues for the "101 on 101 Bike Tour." It is scheduled for October 1, 2016. The tour will start at south Lincoln City and end at Yachats. All five clubs in Region 3, Zone 2 will participate in the project. In addition, the coast clubs are working to have October 1<sup>st</sup> designated as "Lions Day at the Coast." I find several real positives in this project. Most important, the Newport Lions Club, which had been ready to fold, developed this project and has served as the lead club. The project involves five coast clubs. We should get great publicity, and possibly new members, out of the project.

Emerging Lions Leadership Institute: District 36R, for the first time, had two Lions attend the Emerging Lions Leadership Institute which was held last weekend in Denver.

Needless to say, both the seminars and forums, and the instructors were excellent. The two participants came away from the Institute so motivated that we will need to find ways to use all that knowledge and energy.

District Conference: The District 36R District Conference was held in Albany on February Sixth. We ran into some unexpected issues in completing the planning for the

Conference. The first issue was that we were only able to use the main floor of the Events Center due to a scheduling error. Committee Chair Tom Hilgers and his committee figured out how to use the available space, to accommodate all the tables and to run two forums simultaneously. I have already expressed my appreciation to Tom and his committee for a job well done. We also had an issue that we could not control. International Director Robert Libin and his wife Lion Michelle were held up in New York due to weather and missed connecting flights into Eugene. They finally arrived there at about 7:30 PM and arrived in Albany about 10:00 PM., missing the dinner we had planned. Once they arrived, they were excellent representatives of Lions Clubs International. I believe everyone who had any contact with them were very impressed.

Disappointments: One of the goals I established for this year is to look at communications within the District. The plan is to form a Communications Task Force to look at three aspects of communications: Communications between the District and the clubs; insuring that communications gets to the club members that need that information, and improving communications between clubs. We have twice come close to getting the Communications Task Force off the ground. Each time, another issue has come up that takes the Task Force off the front burner. I still plan to address the issue of communications by the end of the year.

Unfortunately, we have lost two clubs this year. The Wolf Creek Club and the Tri Cities Clubs have disbanded due largely to very low membership.

I have visited five clubs for the second time. It was a pleasure to deliver club awards and service chevrons to many Lions who have worked as Lions for many years.

We must develop better ways to get and keep members. This year we have lost many Lions to the Lord. Keeping up with even this loss has been hard.




- The Foundation's Lions Mission Cataract program now has over 30 Ophthalmologists across the

Lions MD 36-O Cabinet Meeting Feb 19, 2016 Alert Committee Co-Chair Sheri Young

Since the fall cabinet meeting: the Alert Co-chairs have taken and given additional trainings, and attended ORVOAD (Oregon Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster) meetings. The most recent ORVOAD meeting was January 19 in the offices of Oregon Emergency Management (OEM) in the DNARC (Major General Donald A Anderson Readiness Center) Salem.

That is the Command center for Oregon Emergency Response (OEM), so it is useful to know how to find if a Lion Alert Chair were part of the ORVOAD response. One purpose of the meeting was for the VOADS to hear from the OEM what the plans are for a major exercise on the (potential government and voluntary) response to a major earthquake.

The exercise "Cascadia Rising" will be run in Oregon, Washington and British Columbia, June 7-10. It is to simulate the first 4 days following a potential "9" earthquake occurring off the Oregon- coast where the "Juan de Fuca" Pacific Ocean tectonic plate moves under the North American plate.

Exercise objectives are to test:

- Operational Communications (ESF 2)
- Health & Medical (ESF 8)
- Mass Care Services (ESF 6 and 11)
- Situational Assessment (ESF 5)
- Critical Transportation (ESF 1)
- Operational Coordination (ESF 5 & 7)

All government responder branches & agencies will have mobilization drills, and all cities and counties, utility companies should participate. Lion Co-Chair Charlene – who represents Lutherans in ORVOAD, is among the few non-government people to have "the play book" for what will happen during the exercise.

Charlene also heads the ORVOAD Long Term Recovery Group (which I am on), which plans for what/how Voluntary Organizations can participate in a true emergency and will help define "our" appropriate roles in this exercise. The main areas are defined below.

We recommend that each Lion Club contact their city or county government emergency manager (if they have not already), ask about their plans for event, and suggest or discuss how that club can participate. The event is likely to be reported in local and regional news, let's be in those reports.

Some MD 36-O clubs have CERT trained members; they may be coordinating through their Fire and Rescue Departments. We hope this exercise will show us how this path is best utilized. People trained through Red Cross may be deployed by them, or may use those skills through community organizations—like Lions! The most common ways VOADS (LIONS!) can assist in emergencies and disasters is through Mass Care (ESF 6 when you're working with government).

#### ESF 6 includes:

- Mass Care
  - Sheltering and feeding
  - Emergency first aid
  - Bulk distribution of emergency items (example: tarps for roofing/tents, blankets...)
  - Collecting & providing information [location, goods/services needed] on those affected – to the family [or responders and response organizations]
  - o [Note: nothing here covers "psychological first aid" for victims or responders.]

- Emergency Assistance
  - Family reunification
  - Sheltering service animals. [Given Lions' Canine connection we should be sure we cover this if no one else can.]
    - Re: other animals:
      - Sheltering Household pets is classified under ESF 17: Agriculture and Animal Protection.
      - In theory, Oregon's Department of Agriculture will handles this ©
      - Red Cross people shelters used to reject animals they are trying to adjust policy. We can help.
  - [Coordinating info on priority goods needed, identifying donors, coordinating transport, locating delivery sites and security. Lions have done this.]
  - Distribution of Donated Goods \*\*\*
    - Donations are government identified as ESF 15 "Volunteers and Donations".
       Oregon Office of Emergency Management thinks this is under their management. ORVOAD recognizes this needs guidelines. Some VOADS already have guidelines our Alert teams could be trained to help.
- Housing
  - Identifying short term housing solutions: repairs, rents, loans, trailers, referrals
  - Intermediate long term housing is addressed in State of Oregon Recovery Plan (SRF 5).
- Human Services: these include having the information to connect people with other government programs & private/non-profit service organizations:
  - Disaster advocate and legal services [Affected people need help with forms and legal advice – Lions helped with this after the Dec 2007 coast range and coastal flooding.
     Attorneys are valuable, but others can be trained.)
  - o Processing other state and federal benefit claims
    - Applications for food stamps
    - Disaster unemployment assistance
    - Veterans assistance & support
- Food and Water
  - Classified under ESF 11: Food and Water
  - Theoretically managed by Department of Human Services.
    - Cities will have primary focus on their water (and power) supplies -
    - Households are responsible for their own on site reserves and wells
    - For the purposes of Cascadia Rising, ESF 6 and ESF 11 will work as a single operation.

This is an excellent time to have the clubs identify to themselves and to the MD 36-O Alert team, what problems they would expect their members and community to suffer, what services they would expect to be called on to perform, what deployment problems they might experience, and how they saw the other responding agencies and organizations able (or not) to contribute.

This will be the largest general disaster preparedness event FEMA (the U.S. Federal Emergency Management Agency) has been part of. As BC is participating, it is international. We need to be part of it. Lions will be part of disaster response when their communities are affected. We need to be known for being prepared and part of the answer.

Our ORVOAD meetings also included reports on Oregon events of 2015: the John Day fires, Clatskanie/Vernonia flooding. We are still working on supporting best responses for Lions to events in the club communities. Charlene's LTRG will help in defining what we can best do. However, this information is also dependent on what the individual clubs have the capacity to do and how they see their role in their committee. Our Alert Committee still needs their input on this. We will try to create short-sheets for club use in building that information for them and the District.

#### Yes:

- The prior recommendations on individual preparation still stand.
- The committee really needs some additional active members, especially someone willing to take on creating an excel sheet with names, experience and contact information for people who will contacts for their clubs, and also for those who would train and serve on training and response teams
- 501c3 capacity, so we can raise money & response gear/goods in advance as well as during crises. We would like MD-36-O to have a 501c3 that serves the worthy and (district, Oregon, LCI/LCIF) approved service programs we provide. Any qualifying program would raise its own funds and provide primary accounting.
- We will provide more information to Alert Team members on where and when trainings are occurring.
- We are making progress. It's a good time to be Lions.
