The MD 36 ALERT team continues to work with Pendleton and District G Lions – particularly District Governor Elect John Taylor and District Governor Gary Mose – as the damage is assessed and the clean up process begins. Watch for communication from the ALERT team for possible ways that we Lions across the state can help in this work.

As we all read the reports of the COVID 19 (corona virus) and wonder if we are all going to be in the path of this disease, it's important to remember that we as Lions are here to help each other as well as our communities. Should a member of your club, a close family member or a friend be exposed to the virus, put into isolation or, more sadly, become ill, there will be ways to help. Work with your club to assess ways that Lions can provide assistance (while still remaining safe from contagion). Lions Clubs International Foundation is offering immediate \$10,000 grants to the districts in Tennessee that were horribly affected by the powerful tornadoes on March 2-3. Remember that by donating \$1,000 to LCIF in the manner of purchasing a Melvin Jones or Progressive Melvin Jones Award, your clubs will be assisting in all of the services that LCIF provides. PID Robert Littlefield is looking forward to presenting many MJ or PMJ Awards at the MD 36 convention on Saturday, May 16 in Canyonville. If your club's chosen awardee will not be attending the MD 36 convention, recognition will still be given! If award(s) are mailed to your club secretary and the awardee will be present, please be sure to have the materials brought to the convention with whoever is representing your club.

Service Reporting: Clubs continue to remain active serving their communities. However, service reporting is still down. Sixteen clubs currently have non-recorded service report activity. Mary Marcelonis: LVG's First Donor for Ocular Research in Boston

When Lions VisionGift (LVG) opened a location in the Seaport area of Boston in 2017, one of our commitments to the local community was to finally make ocular research tissue donation a reality. Two years later, on June 13th, 2019, LVG made good on that commitment. But it wasn't LVG alone, it took one woman's lifetime of giving, and the tenacity of her loving son to make it happen.

The day before, June 12th, Brian Marcelonis was contemplating what to do once his mother, Mary Murphy Marcelonis, who suffered from dementia, passed away. Having recently looked through some family files and spoken with his mother, Brian was proud of the fact that both his grandmother and mother wished to have their brains donated for dementia research. While he knew of his mother's wishes to donate her brain for research, he wondered if there was anything more that could be done to help others with eye issues as there were many members of his mother's family that had suffered from eye problems. As Brian says, "That's what my mom was all about, helping other people".



A lifelong Boston resident, early on Mary had set her sights on teaching as a way to make a difference. As former student, Frank Iarrobino says, "If there were more Mrs. Marcelonis walking the earth, the world would be a happier, safer and smarter place." Mary was president of the class of 1949 at Notre Dame Academy in Roxbury and was also president of the class of 1953 at Boston Teacher's College. She received a master's degree in education from Boston University in 1969. As a person and an educator, Mary led with kindness and humility. She took great pleasure in assisting challenged students who needed guidance and direction. She especially enjoyed helping students that were applying for scholarships and sharing in their joy when their efforts were rewarded. As Brian recounts, "I found letters from former students, I talked to several of the teachers that she taught with, and my mom

was just one dynamic, dedicated teaching professional. It's what she always wanted to do - have a positive impact on other people's lives."

Mary's gift has gone to find a treatment, and hopefully one day a cure for macular degeneration. And just as it is clear that Mary led a life of giving, and instilled that in the generations that have followed, it is also clear that her legacy will continue to touch the lives of countless others through her generous final gift.

Breakthrough for Type 1 Diabetes

I was on the internet looking for anything that might be of importance, when I came across the heading above. The article was on the webpage of "The Stem Cellar." This is what it said.

More often than not, people don't really think about their blood sugar levels before setting down to enjoy a delicious meal, partake in a tasty dessert or go out for a bicycle ride. But for type 1 diabetes (T1D) patients, every minute revolves around the readout from a glucose meter, a device used to measure blood sugar levels.

Normally, the pancreas contains beta cells that produce insulin in order to maintain blood sugar levels in the normal range. Unfortunately, those with T1D have an immune system that destroys their own beta cells, thereby decreasing or preventing the production of insulin and, in turn, the regulation of blood sugar levels. Chronic spikes in blood sugar levels can lead to blindness, nerve damage, kidney failure, heart disease, stroke and even death.

Those with T1D manage their condition by injecting themselves with insulin anywhere from two to four times a day. A light workout, slight change in diet or even an exciting event can have a serious impact that requires a meter check and an insulin injection.

There are clinical trials involving transplants of pancreatic "islets", clusters of cells containing healthy beta cells, but these rely on a pancreases from deceased donors and taking immune suppressing drugs for life.

What if there was a way to produce healthy beta cells in a lab without the need of a transplant?

Dr. Matthias Hebrok, director of the UCSF diabetes center, and Dr. Gopika Nair, postdoctoral fellow, have discovered how to transform human stem cells into healthy, insulin producing beta cells.

In a news release written by Dr Nicholas Weiler of UCSF, Dr. Hebrok is quoted as saying, "We can now generate insulin-producing cells that look and act a lot like the pancreatic beta cells you and I have in our bodies. This is a critical step towards our goal of creating cells that could be transplanted into patients with diabetes."

For the longest time, scientist could only produce cells that, at an immature stage, were unable to respond to blood sugar levels and secrete insulin properly. Dr. Hebrok and Dr Nair discovered that mimicking the "islet" formation of cells in the pancreas helped the cells mature. These cells were then transplanted into mice and found that they were fully functional, producing insulin and responding to changes blood sugar levels.

Dr. Hebrok's team is already in collaboration with various colleagues to make cells transplantable into patients. In the article, Dr. Nair is also quoted as saying, "Current therapeutics like insulin injection only treat the symptoms of the disease. Our work points to several exciting avenues to finally finding a cure." Dr. Hebrok added, "We finally able to move forward on a number of different fronts that were previously closed to us. The possibilities seem endless."

Dr. Hebrok, who is also a member of the CIRM (California Institute for Regenerative Medicine) funded {UCSF Eli and Edythe Broad Center of Regenerative Medicine and Stem Cell Research), was senior author of the new study, which was published February 1, 2019, in Nature Cell Biology.

Where the Plastic Meets the Road

"Plastics" is what Ben Braddock heard in the movie *The Graduate* back in 1967. "The window is closing faster on plastics than on climate change, I really believe," said Scott Rosin of *Plastic Up-Cycling.* The stats on the ground and in the water are staggering. "Think about it," he said. "Predictions of a billion tons of plastic produced each year by 2025. Compare that to 1.5 million pounds produced in 1950."

He went on to punctuate this staggering stat. "Predictions about current rates of plastic waste state by 2050 there will be more plastic in the ocean than fish." Rosin sees innovator TechniSoil of Redding, California, as taking recycled plastics, bitumen, asphalt substrate and integrating it into a flexible and long-lasting paving mixture (up to 15 percent of the total volume for paving roads could be plastic).


Then there is *MacRebur*, a Scottish Company, working in Southern India helping people at landfills gather potentially reusable items and sell them. Rosin observed that some of the plastics the pickers culled were put into potholes and set on fire. Instant melted plasticize pothole filler. "Not the most environmentally friendly way to fill potholes," Rosin stated, "However those plastic-filled potholes outlasted the actual roads."

"MD-36 Lions are leaders in environmental projects and I am sure many clubs have projects involving the recycling of plastics," stated Ted Carlin, MD-36 Environmental Chairperson.

The five will then go the MD-36 Lions Convention in Canyonville in May 2020. Each registered participant will be given a ticket to vote for the best Nature/Scenery Photo of the year. The winner will receive a GoPro photo and video camera and head strap for wearing it. All top five finalists will be recognized at the MD-36 Convention.

All of the photo entries (there were 78 in 2018-19) will be displayed and Lions will be able to purchase them through a Silent Auction. See you in Canyonville...

Greetings OLSHF Trustees, Staff, and Friends:

On behalf of OLSHF Board leadership, we wanted to reach out to you with our organization's stance in light of the COVID-19 pandemic and outbreak here in the United States and in Oregon.

As of our writing this, there are 114 known cases of COVID-19 in Oregon. Based on the number of COVID-19 tests available, it stands to reason that there are far more than this in actuality. The illness very likely is already in your community. Those exposed to the virus are directed to "self quarantine" to reduce exposure to others, to emergency responders, and to their families. Public health experts urge us not to panic, rather to be concerned and take precautions.

We believe that this is a legitimate danger to all of our well-being and that it is time to take the Corona Virus seriously. Our healthcare system does not have the capacity to provide care to the amount of patients that are projected to need hospitalization if steps are not taken to "Flatten the Curve" of hospital visits. It is time to take reasonable and rational steps to protect other Oregonians and ourselves.

We are in the process of determining exactly what steps will be implemented by OLSHF to support the effort of "Social Distancing" that is necessary to slow the spread of the virus and to "Flatten the Curve" of hospital visits. Social Distancing measures are taken to restrict when and where people can gather to stop or slow the spread of infectious diseases. Social distancing measures include limiting large groups of people coming together, closing buildings and canceling events.

These Social Distancing steps now include, but likely won't be limited to:

- Postponing all School Vision Screening events through at least April.
- Shifting upcoming supporter events to 'virtual' campaigns for Keep the Promise to support patient services and hearing assistance.
- OLSHF staff working remotely and closing Eye Promise Optical to the public through April.

It is strongly recommended that you take steps as well. We are early in the outbreak and health officials expect far more cases to be reported. It is expected to get much worse before it gets better.

We ask that we all follow the guidance of the medical professionals at the Oregon Health Authority: https://tinyurl.com/OHA-Website





What Did 18 CRR Lions Do This Fall?

One hundred, thirty-six vision screenings were conducted by eighteen Crooked River Ranch Lions at 42 different schools in Central and Eastern Oregon this fall. A total of 15,394 students were screened at these schools with the important number of 1,225 student referrals for further eye exams. Many times the parents, teachers and the student were unaware there was a vision problem and the Lions are so proud when a student gets an eye exam, corrected vision and does better in both life and school.

"There were Lions from eight different Lions clubs in Central and Eastern Oregon volunteering at these screenings," said Central Oregon Vision Screening Coordinator Ted Carlin of Crooked River Ranch Lions. "The great part is all these different Lions clubs working together, telling stories, laughing, but taking seriously the job of screening the student's vision," he continued.

Bend, La Pine, Prineville, Madras, Sisters, Redmond, Sherman County, Burns, Silver Lake Lions helped screen the more than 15,000 students from mid-September until mid-December.

Greta O'Brien, CRR Lions, was "Vision Screener of the Year", assisting with 38 different screenings during this time. Jon Awbrey, did 32 screenings, while Vene Dunham and Gail Desbrisay each assisted with 16 screening. All of CRR Lions were also busy during the fall.

"We have a couple more elementary schools and middle schools to screen in 2020 and by the time they are finished it will be golf season," stated Ted Carlin.


