1. Call to Order: CC Judith Poage called the Council of Governors meeting to order on February 3, 2023 at 1:17 pm. The meeting was held in person only.

Invocation was given by PDG Phyllis Carlin.

The Pledge of Allegiance was led by PDG Stephen Brewster.

Introduction of Guests: CC Judith noted there were no guests to introduce.

- 3. Approval of Minutes of November 19, 2022 Council Meeting. *Motion* made by DG Gail Black to approve the Minutes of November 19, 2022 Council Meeting. The *motion* was *seconded* by DG Kerith Vance. *Motion carried*.

- 6. Executive Administrator Report: PCC Vincent F. Bishop. Reference Attachment #3. PCC Vincent Bishop added that the first check on the grant to BuildASign was stolen for the yard signs and fraudulently cashed. He worked with Leah at the MD36 Headquarter's office to get this resolved. She filed a formal police complaint with the Eugene Police Department and the monies have all been recovered. In the meantime, it was all covered by an anonymous donor.

 - a) Awards, Honors & Contests. CC Judith said everyone received copies of the changes requested from Lion Paula. She requested comments from the Council, but no one spoke. PCC Vincent said she would need to come back to this as she couldn't have a motion without comments.
- 11. New Business:
 - a) Constitution & Bylaws. PCC Bob Chaney noted that his report was submitted and in everyone's packet. DG Gail Black moved to have this voted on at the MD36 Convention. PDG Stephen Brewster seconded. Request for discussion. DG David expressed concern that the version being edited was an older version and he felt we need to be making changes to the most current version. The 2015 version from Seaside was found

(and is on the MD36 website) and so DG David asked whether PCC Bob Chaney could make edits to this 2015 version with consultation from the members of his committee and get them to the voting members of the Council to look at. PCC Vincent Bishop agreed to reach out to Jim Vincent (Credentials Chair) and see exactly what had been ratified and when over the course of COVID things seemed to go a little sideways. That gives ample time for it be sent to clubs and supports the 60-days requirement to make any changes before it is voted on in Seaside at the MD36 Convention. DG Gail withdrew her motion and PDG Steve Brewster withdrew his 2nd of her motion. CC Judith referred this back to the Constitution & Bylaws Committee and called for a zoom meeting on March 12, 2023 at 6pm to discuss this further. This will allow for the 60-days requirement before it is voted on at the MD36 Convention. They are going to look into what was looking to be voted on and whether things were ratified. Jim Vincent will know this information. PCC Paul Zastrow also brought up some possible cleanup issues presented in 2020, 2021 and 2022 that were possibly ratified. Confirming with Jim Vincent will be important and PCC Vincent Bishop confirmed he would follow up on this. March 19, 2023 will be the deadline for this to be mailed out to the clubs in order for this to be voted on by the clubs for the MD36 Convention in Seaside on May 19-21, 2023 in Seaside.

It doesn't have to be a new project.

Convention Operating: PCC Joyce Anderson, Chair. Reference Attachment #12. PCC Joyce spoke and said that the Convention Committee has met and things are going well. The State Convention will be in Seaside May 19-20, 2023 and PCC Joyce shared that the remodel is complete and the facility looks great. The OLSHF Trustee meeting will be on May 18, 2023 from 9-12 and will be followed by the Council of Governor's meeting at 1:30pm. All displays HAVE TO BE OUT OF CONVENTION CENTER BY 10PM ON SATURDAY NIGHT. Otherwise, we will be charged \$500. We also won't have a block of rooms available this time. We lost \$6,000 the last time we held one here because we blocked rooms and not enough Lions booked them. PCC Joyce asked for approval of the registration fee of \$140 per person. This fee will increase at midnight on April 28, 2023 to \$165.00 per person and the cutoff date for all registrations is May 12, 2023. Her second request was for a \$4,000.00 advance from the MD36 Convention Account to make sure we cover all expenses. Motion made by DG Gail Black to approve the \$140 MD36 Convention registration fee, which will have an increase as of midnight on April 28, 2023 to \$165.00 per person at which time it will go up to \$165.00 per person. The cutoff date for all registrations will be May 12, 2023. The motion was seconded by DG David O'Kelley. No discussion. Motion carried. Motion made by DG Gail Black to advance \$4,000.00 from the Convention Account to cover bills needed for the convention. The motion was seconded by DG

Kerith Vance. DG David O'Kelley asked how much money was in this fund. As of September, 2022, PCC Joyce said there was roughly 22,000 in this account. They just don't want to come to you later to ask for it. It will stay there until it is needed in May. *Motion carried*.



We will also have presentations on the Peace Poster and Quest to see if we can spark some interest in our clubs to try one or both in the next year. District Governor's Report for 36-R

I completed the DG visits to all 32 of our clubs on January 18th with the visit to the Philomath Lions. As we prepared for our District Convention this year getting to know the clubs and their leadership helped when reaching out to them about attending our convention this year. Our convention which is the next day after this meeting, February 4th, will probably be attended by 120 members and guests representing 28 different clubs. We expect a lot of fellowship and ideas to be shared that will bring members together from all of our districts and our one international district with our International Director speaker. We also have three outside speakers presenting on topics that are relevant to our global causes. We look forward to having a great convention this year that brings value to all that attend.

We have received our LCI PR Grant signs and are prepared to distribute them at our convention to the clubs that are attending. Lion Fran Silbernagel has completed contact with all of our clubs about the status of their brochures and has recruited at least one member that will work with any club that needs help creating a brochure. We have line-of-sight on a couple of more members that will also help. We are working with the Multiple District to provide access to all our club's brochures via the MD36 website. This effort is expected to help new members find a club in their area that aligns with their service passions. We also are anticipating receiving the bumper magnets soon and understand that they have now been ordered. I do want to also high light how the districts came together for this effort and made this possible for our districts, clubs, members and communities. If we can replicate this process in other areas where only the Multiple District can access grants imagine how much more service could be brought back to our communities.

We have a Q3 District cabinet meeting on February 18th, hosted by Salem Northeast. We continue to ask our club leadership to attend as it allows for a broader perspective as we discuss the District's business. One of the main topics of this cabinet meeting will be to discuss a proposal by Central Lions to pursue a District Hunger Grant in support of a new food bank in their area. We believe the last time we went after a non-Disaster district grant, was when we helped construct the Heartfelt House in Springfield. These district grants usually take some percentage of our clubs to support them and often allow us to partner with other organizations when finding the matching donations. It would be nice if we had a backlog of district grant projects that we could support every year to bring and improve service in our communities. We only have to come together as both clubs and members to make this happen.

Finally, our leadership team will focus the remainder of the year on identifying new Lions that can refresh and bring new energy to our district leadership positions. While it might not immediately address our district governor issues, it can result in creating a

new pool of eligible Lions that can become a future district governor. If we are to succeed, we all need to get engaged in supporting their service aspirations and passions. We must also provide them with opportunities for leadership training and mentorship from the many Lions in our district who have preceded them. Report 36E - Oregon & Northern California
District Governor Gail Black

Due to distances to travel, unknown roads, and weather conditions, I have found it prudent to curtail some of my club visitations at this time. I am currently focusing on the District E convention plans, as well as plans for the NWLLI. I plan to continue visitations starting in March and should finish up in early May.

In the meantime, I have urged clubs via email communications to continue to do everything they can to attain new members, and to supply those new members, as well as current members with training and projects to hold their interest and thus retain membership. At the End of December, our total membership was at 584. Since July 1, we have added 48 members and dropped 49. 14 of our 29 clubs have less than 20 members, and 4 of those have less than 10. These figures are based on the MMR reports that are submitted and I am sorry to say that MMR reports are not always being submitted as they should be, with 7 out of our 29 clubs not having reported for 3 months or more.

One of our clubs which currently has 12 members, is looking at 6 members dropping, while at the same time gaining 1 new member, and are talking about the possibility of this 75 year old club folding. The problem here seems to be the same as in many clubs, with just a minority of 4-5 more mature members, who will hold an office, attend meetings, and do all the work, and they are getting very tired. Our GAT team is working with this club to generate more members, and to assist with ideas and activities to insure the club remains an active club.

For the most part, the clubs in District E are doing well, and are active in their communities with projects and fund raisers. Most all of the clubs have been able to assist with the eye screening being done each area of the district, and this continues to be one of the most active projects. It has been hard for many of the clubs to get started up again., but those with annual projects and/or fund raisers are once again getting out there in the community. All of the clubs are looking forward to getting the items from the PR grant that MD36 has been able to get, and putting them to use.

On March 17-18 District E will hold their annual convention in Sutherlin at the community Center with our theme for the year of "Serving from the Heart". Applications and information have been sent out to all of the District E clubs, and to the District Secretaries of the other 3 districts. We are looking forward to having PID Justin Faber as our international guest and key note speaker. Our 2nd Vice District Governor will be on the ballot to be elected as 1st Vice District Governor but at the present time we are very concerned about the fact that we have no one who is qualified to be elected to the position of District Governor.

"Together We Can" our international theme for this year is so important as we, not just as individual clubs, but as districts, and as a multiple district work together to achieve those results in our communities that we as Lions are noted for in being the greatest Service organization in the world. Together We can - Together We are - Together we will continue to do so.



MD 36 Council of Governors Report February 2023

Lions VisionGift celebrates 29 years of Board Service by Lion Bob Van Slyke. His last meeting before stepping down will be February 24, 2023. Among many accomplishments, Bob served as Chair of the Board of Directors from 2017 through 2018. Througout his tenure Bob oversaw numerous changes — most notably in our overall impact to the community.

When Bob started on the Board, almost all transplants were full thickness grafts called penetrating keratoplasty. Today, through extensive research and development by surgeons, Lions VisionGift and other eye banks, most cornea transplants are now split thickness grafts that have been processed in clean rooms using highly specialized tools that used to be found only in hospital operating rooms. It's been a remarkable journey.

Bob was part of the hiring committee that selected me as CEO when Barbara Crow retired after 18 years. Bob was essential in our decision to open a new



location in Boston that has led to dramatic increases in our collaboration with east coast academic institutions like Harvard and Johns Hopkins. And most recently, he was part of the decision to help start a new company dedicated to laboratory grown transplants. The new company is called OcuCell (www.ocucell.bio). The role of our Board is critical for a number of reasons. The Board makes sure that our mission is always considered first. Bob always kept this in mind when offering his opinions about critical topics. Always the mission and those we serve.

Oregon Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation Council of Governors Report February 3rd, 2023

School Vision Screening

As of January 27th, 2023 our SVS Program has screened 126,466 Oregon students for vision health issues, referring 19,073 (15.1%) for comprehensive eye exams. We have conducted 563 SVS events at Oregon schools so far throughout every part of Oregon.

We've added many school districts this school year, primarily in rural Oregon, and also in larger communities. New school disticts include schools in Butte Falls, Echo, Monument, Gladstone and even Reynolds High School, east of Portland. We project that we will screen between 155,000 and 170,000 students statewide this year.

MD-36 Lions and OLSHF were recognized by Lions International's Lions KidSight USA as the #1 Lions vision screening program in the U.S. This recognition has strengthened the Foundation's ability to secure funding from Oregon-based foundations to help make progress toward our "20/20 Vision" of one day all Oregon students having their vision screened each year.

Constitution and Bylaws proposed changes report Third Council of Governors meeting February 3, Eugene, Oregon

The below information was sent to the Council in January and after a little bit of rewording on one item (PDGA) again on Thursday to give them all an opportunity to review it before the meeting. What follows are the proposed changes to the Constitution and Bylaws.

As many are aware there has been some confusion and/or opposition to this entire process.

I feel I need to remind everyone that the Constitution and Bylaws is what drives the Policy Manual and is currently out of alignment with the PM. The PM is seeing several revisions this year as well.

The current C&B was emailed out in September to members of the committee with some suggested changes and a request to return information. What was returned was incorporated. Then another round was recently sent out and those changes are reflected here.

Some have stated that the C&B hasn't been amended in eight years and therefore there is no pressing need to amend it now and that a complete overhaul can be done in the near future. It is my contention that this is the exact reason why there needs to be amendments made in order to bring it current. A complete overhaul can then be done under another person's supervision. And if the truth be told there was an amendment to the C&B just last year when we increased MD 36 dues to \$23 per year.

Taking into consideration and incorporating the feedback from the representatives it is recommended to move forward with the acceptance of these proposed changes and placing them on the ballot at the multiple district convention.

If approved as is or with changes from the COG this information will be distributed to the clubs of MD 36 for their review and subsequent vote at the MD36 convention in Seaside in May.

I was asked to put each of the proposed changes into context and give an explanation for the reason for the proposed change.

What follows is the brief synopsis of the change and the explanation, which is in green print. I am not going to delineate any further than a simple reason.

Again the changes are in red print.

The deletions are in Strikethrough.

The one comment for the COG to take a look at a particular item is in blue print.

CONSTITUTION ARTICLE V Multiple District Convention

Section 1: A Convention of this Multiple District shall be held each year prior to the date set for the International Convention at a place selected by the vote of the delegates present, qualified and registered at the preceding annual Convention of this Multiple District; at the location chosen by the Convention Committee and following in the order of said location by District as follows O, E, G, R, the time to be fixed by the Council of Governors, to conclude at least 30 days prior to convening date of the International Convention.

The convention committee has been operating in the manner that is proposed for a number of years and the C&B should reflect current practice.

Section 2: The Council of Governors shall have supervision over all phases of the State Multiple District Convention and Shall elect a presiding officer and a secretary of such convention.

We also have clubs in California and are known as a multiple district

BYLAWS ARTICLE II Council of Governors

Section 7: The Council of Governors shall appoint the members and chairman of Multiple District Standing

Committees, including but not limited to:

International Exchange.

A. Constitution and By-Laws, Convention, Finance & Budget, Participation, Public Relations & Publicity Lions Information and Youth (The COG needs to decide whether or not to list any other of the MD36 committees here)

The change in name is to reflect the name that is currently being used in the Policy Manual

B. A Lion should, but is not limited to serving serve on but one such committee at any time.

Added to reflect what has been being done for several years on all committees

C. Term on committee should rotate to assure continuity of experienced members.

Removed because this language can be used if needed in the policy and not the C&B where if changed it doesn't take a vote of the entire MD

BYLAWS ARTICLE III

Past District Governor's Association

Section 3: Meetings: The Past District Governor's Association shall hold-three (3) one (1) regular meetings as follows:

- A. Mid-Year at the call of the President.
- **B.** Immediately prior to the annual Multiple District Convention at a time and place set by the President.
- C. Immediately following the annual Multiple District Convention at a time and place set by the President.

Change to coincide with the changes made in the policy and voted on at a PDGA meeting a couple of years ago.

Section 5: Quorum: Twenty or more (50% +1 of the members present and voting shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of transacting business of the Past District Governor's Association.) member of the Past District Governor's Association shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of transacting business.

Better language and reflects who should be making decisions for the PDGA.

BYLAWS ARTICLE V

Multiple District Convention

Section 2: Sergeant at Arms: The Council of Governors shall may appoint a Sergeant at Arms and such assistants as may be necessary who shall be responsible for the maintenance of proper order and decorum at the Multiple District Convention, and who shall perform such duties as are incident to the office.

Just a simple language change. This hasn't been done for a long time but rather than remove the ability to do so just make it optional.

Section 3: Program: The Convention Committee Council of Governors shall arrange a program, approved by the Council of Governors, for the Multiple District Convention, and the same shall be the order of the day.

This change is to reflect what has been done for the past several years.

This report will be submitted to the Council of Governors third meeting in Eugene in February for approval to move forward with submission to the Multiple District for ratification at the MD convention in Seaside in May.



Hearing Aids: Aids from Phonak, Starkey, Sonic Innovations, and refurbished continue to be available to qualified applicants.

The following information is new since the last quarterly report and the absence of detailed information does not mean those services were discontinued but that no changes have occurred.

<u>Cost change:</u> ROAR! Program Hearing Aid fees have changed for all Lions clients outside of Lane County. This means that all ROAR! Clients outside of Land County will be asked to pay \$100 per hearing aid until further notice.

CLINICS/EVENTS:

1. Thanks to Roseburg Lion Di Toleno who volunteered all day at the event and Sutherlin Lion Jon White who secured the Sutherlin Community Center for the event, opened and closed the center and picked up lunch for the crew. Some of the folks helped had been waiting nearly a year to get help with hearing aids!!

PROVIDERS:

- 1. We referred our first 6 Lions Clients to Pacific Northwest Audiology in Bend this week! This is BIG news for the Bend area who have been without a ROAR! provider since Dr. Landsberg moved. We are hoping that Central Oregon ENT will also partner with the Lions and together, these two new ROAR! providers along with existing ROAR provider, My Hearing Centers, should be able to tackle the need in and around Deschutes County.
- We have reached out to potential providers in Lake Oswego, Salem, Tillamook, and Corvallis, and are waiting to hear back.

3. Our provider in Astoria, Bayside Audiology, sold her practice and we have confirmed that the new owner, Dr. Kerry Farmer, will continue to partner with the Lions. The Astoria Lions Club has been actively involved in continuing this partnership and the provider scheduled their first Lions client this week!

 We intend to reach out to Costco again about the possibility of partnering with the Lions. The last time we inquired about a partnership was 2017.

New Hats Project is debuting in Lane County. OLSHF is partnering with Pacific University School of Audiology (PUSOA) to offer Hearing Assistive Technology. This could include devices such as smoke alarms, alarm clocks and possibly devices and tools to help someone do their job safer and moreeffectively. Grad Student Michael Parisi has hit the ground running. He has created a 1-pager for Lions along with a 1-page product list. OLSHF Videographer, John Webb, will come out to the Pacific Hillsboro campus in early February to shoot some videos with Michael. In these series of videos, Michael will introduce the program and demonstrate various HATS products.

LCIF Report

With Campaign 100 being now over and as 'new' push begun for collections of International Lions Funding for LCIF, I can only say that we of MD 36 have not done well. First being not every District with a designated District Coordinator, and secondly we continually are using the excuse that even with the pandemic of Covid being essentially over, there still has been little money donated by the Lions of MD 36. Oregon has an economy that seems first into financial difficulties and last out!

But – the needs still exist and we are continually bombarded with knowing there are things everywhere that need to be addressed. At least Oral Hull Foundation has been awarded a grant to help improve some structures on their campus for their swimming pool and kitchen. Plus a Publicity Grant that each District has some fliers and items available for Lion usage for our members in the communities we serve.

Looking at some longer range giving, there are a number of Clubs and individuals who have donated over the years – with some having qualified for Melvin Jones Fellowships valued at \$1,000 each. District O has accumulated some \$72,900+; District R with some \$134,800+; District E has raised over \$18,200 and District G has been credited with over \$43.500. The amounts individually vary from \$5.00 to \$50,000. Every contribution of \$1,000 can be named for an award of either a Melvin Jones Fellow or a Progressive MJF. I have with me a list of the Individuals and clubs with amounts of their respective installments. Individuals can award either themselves or name others for recognition with MJF.

I also have a list of the MJF(s) and PMJF(s), but did not bring that list with me.

LCIF keeps track of MJF and PMJF recognitions as well as the installments over the years. I know that the list is at least 20 years in the making, as in 2003 at the first Portland USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum Lion Beverly Roberts donated some \$150 to LCIF without leaving her address or membership number at the LCIF table. (I asked her if she wanted credit and she declined saying that as the \$\$ went into the foundations accounts, that was all that was needed.)

So – unlike our own Foundation, both clubs and individuals have ample opportunity to donate as well as reward recognition without worrying about having to be on a 3-year timeline. OLS&H Foundation has more awards by name and dollar amounts, but limits by time when these can be awarded and accumulated by clubs and individuals.

In all cases, let's redouble our efforts to donate our dollars for these worthwhile causes by digging deep in our pockets and ensure that our tax-deductible foundations can do even more to make the world a better place for those in need!

The LCI Youth Exchange Program allows for the exchange of young adults throughout the world – giving great experiences for host families and youth. WE need hosts as well as youth willing to become exchangees. To that end, if you can see it in yourselves to truly volunteer in a cause – become a host parent to a young adult from a foreign country!

Becoming a Host Family

Are you interested in learning about other cultures and ways of life while sharing your own customs and experiences? Are open-mindedness, tolerance and cultural competence of high importance to you? Do you have a desire to contribute towards peace, international understanding and the creation of global citizenship in youth? If you have answered "yes" to any of these questions, you may enjoy being a host family for this, the 60th year of the Lions Youth Camps and Exchange Program. Interested – contact Paul at pzastrow@gorge.net.

Benefits of Hosting

Hosting an exchange youth or two is guaranteed to be a rewarding experience because:

- 1 you experience the joy of sharing your culture and daily customs
- 2 you learn about the exchange youth's customs and culture
- 3 you open a new world of possibilities and thinking to the exchange youth
- 4 you make a new friend perhaps for life

Expectations of a Host Family

You are expected to provide room and board for the youth. It is recommended that youth be in contact with others of approximate age and similar genders. Meals should be balanced and healthy.

Typically, you are responsible for all of the youth's transportation during the exchange. This travel may include transfers to and from airports or train stations, with other host families or to a camp or organized activity. If you have agreed to cover cultural activities, you may wish to pay for any entry fees that may be charged.

Although normally Lions members host incoming youth, it is not a requirement that you be a Lions member. There are as number of items that are necessary to be screened prior to being issued an exchangee.

Essentially your youth is to be treated as a member of your family while being with you, and participating in normal family activities, such as picnics, sports activities, cultural visits, and more. Be sure that you can make the time available to support quality time with assigned youth!

A family can host more than one youth, should be of the same gender and from different countries – so they can truly share greater cultural experiences. Additionally, hosts can share incoming youth – for example we had 5 families sharing 3 youth from Austria and Italy several years ago.

September was Childhood Cancer Awareness Month. Gold is the "color" for Childhood Cancer. All month long, organizations around the world focus on raising awareness through social media, education and events. But, Cancer is not limited to one month or once a month.
