Greeting Lions of District 36R,

While being small (5 members) the Jefferson Lions club is active in their community as are many of our smaller clubs. Did you know District R has 16 clubs with less than 15 members. This is not an impediment for our members to serve their communities. I have heard too many times that if a club falls below 20 members, they can no longer be a Lions Club and that is not true, 20 members are required when starting a new Lions Club.

Another thing I have experienced this year is that LCI is very responsive to the District Governors (DGs). For our clubs, what that means, if you need something from LCI and are not getting a response, get the DG involved. The Waldport Lions Help Kids in Need



On November 4, 2022, the Waldport Lions Club was awarded the Siletz Tribal Contribution Fund Award of \$2,000 to help fund the Lions Backpack Program serving homeless youth attending Crestview Elementary School and Waldport Middle/High Schools. Currently the Backpack Program provides food twice a month for 50 youth. There is such a need in South Lincoln County, the Lions Backpack Program has a goal to provide 100 students with nutritious groceries every weekend. Weekends and school breaks are especially critical for the homeless population because when school is closed, children are not provided with breakfast, lunch and snack.

For a better understanding of the need in our community, consider that the assistance given to families does not cover the need with food prices on the rise. This coupled with the fact that local stores in South Lincoln County are all convenience stores, not large chain grocery stores which adds to the basic cost of food. So, the Lions Backpack Program is essential to our families in need.

The close to being official Fighting Irish Leo Club members assist with the Lion Backpack Program by shopping for groceries with the intent of avoiding products heavily ladened with sugar. After the shopping trip, groceries are brought to the ASPIRE Office where Petter Colley (who will be their Leo Club Advisor) and Lions Backpack Coordinator,



The mid-November weather held and Lions converged at Bob Texas T-Bone Restaurant in Rufus for the second District G Cabinet Meeting.

Following the usual procedural affairs involving the Oregon State Registry, District address changes, budget proposals, clubs in good standing and bank signatures, the committee chairs gave their reports.



PCC Paul Zastrow, District G's Treasureer, discusses International grants.

PCC Paul Zastrow noted that more than 495 million people were helped by Lions worldwide. This was an increase of more than 100 million people served over the previous years, thanks to the unwavering commitment of 1.4 million Lions around the word. PCC Zastrow gave some facts of Lions awarding 1,254 grants totaling over \$35 million to support communities. The Lions mobilized the Refugees and Displaced persons fund to award nearly \$1.8 million in grants for support to Ukraine refugees, and Lions ensured over 789 million community members access to nutritious foods. PCC Zastrow also noted that in MD36, over the vears of LCIF existence, some \$1.8 million has been given in direct assistance including disaster relief, construction of a patient guest house, food banks, dialysis beds and much more. He encouraged all clubs to donate to our Foundation.

District Governor Cheri Jackson discussed the District photo contest and indicated that any Lion photo would be accepted, but she encouraged pictures of Lion activities or environmental photos. Five photos will be selected from those entered to be sent to the District convention. DG Cheri also encouraged clubs to enter the Peace Poster Contest. DG Cheri noted that the club tri-folds displaying activities are still encouraged at the district level.


2nd Cabinet Meeting

PDG Gerald Hopkins gave a report on the progress of the public relations grant, and will get additional information for the cabinet. PDG Hopkins also discussed projects of the Elgin Lions since the last district meeting which included a basketball tournament, community Christmas tree, Light Parade, Trunk or Treat, Pie & Ice Cream social for the community, public restroom, sponsoring of a blood drive, and the purchase of 22 examinations and glasses for community members.

Lion Greg Simpson noted that Hood River is holding a grocery raffle with \$500 of prizes for the winners. He stated their Christmas tree pickup project was successful once again last winter. Collection of cans has netted approximately \$60,000 for the year. The club helps sponsor the LEOS and donates \$15,000 of the recycled cans back to the LEOS, who also participate in the drive. A major project being discussed by the club is the bunk bed project, in which Lions build and distribute bunk beds to kids, so they do not have to sleep on the floor, which is happening in some of the homes. Simpson stated they may pair up with Rotary to pursue the project.

Jeff Stiles of The Dalles Lions, also said that the Lions joined forces with Kiwanis and Rotary members to sponsor a blood drive. A major project for the community involved bringing in 250 guest artists, who painted 15 walls of murals. The club has already screened 500 students and still has some of the local schools to serve. Stiles mentioned that Public Relations is an area the club would like to develop. He noted there has been discussion about creating a movie to show what the Lions are doing in their own community.

The Hood River Eye Openers are continuing with the program of Families in the Park each Thursday. The success has been outstanding. They have served breakfast for the annual fly-in by aircraft.

Youth Exchange Program

Becoming a Host Family

Are you interested in learning about other cultures and ways of life while sharing your own customs and experiences? Are open-mindedness, tolerance and cultural competence of high importance to you? Do you have a desire to contribute towards peace, international understanding and the creation of global citizenship in youth? If you have answered "yes" to any of these questions, you may enjoy being a host family for this, the 60th year of the Lions Youth Camps and Exchange Program. Interested – contact Paul at pzastrow@gorge.net.

Benefits of Hosting

Hosting an exchange youth or two is guaranteed to be a rewarding experience because:

- 1 you experience the joy of sharing your culture and daily customs
- 2 you learn about the exchange youth's customs and culture
- 3 you open a new world of possibilities and thinking to the exchange youth
- 4 you make a new friend perhaps for life

Expectations of a Host Family

You are expected to provide room and board for the youth. It is recommended that youth be in contact with others of approximate age and similar genders. Meals should be balanced and healthy.

Typically, you are responsible for all of the youth's transportation during the exchange. This travel may include transfers to and from airports or train stations, with other host families or to a camp or organized activity. If you have agreed to cover cultural activities, you may wish to pay for any entry fees that may be charged.

Although normally Lions members host incoming youth, it is not a requirement that you be a Lions member. There are as number of items that are necessary to be screened prior to being issued an exchange student.

Essentially your youth is to be treated as a member of your family while being with you and participating in normal family activities, such as picnics, sports activities, cultural visits, and more. Be sure that you can make the time available to support quality time with assigned youth!

A family can host more than one youth, should be of the same gender and from different countries – so they can truly share greater cultural experiences. Additionally, hosts can share incoming youth – for example we had 5 families sharing 3 youth from Austria and Italy several years ago.


