The Year in review: A Glance at our Future

Lions VisionGift is thrilled to report that, upon reflection, 2015 turned out to be a wonderful year for the organization. We achieved new benchmarks in several donor and tissue related categories; we made several key additions to our facility and team; and we accomplished all this while delivering unique value to our surgeons and stakeholders which bolsters our name and helps fuel the growth we expect to continue into the New Year.

Success is often first measured by metrics, so it seems like a good place to start for us as well, and by all accounts, 2015 was a bumper year. Our pure and simple donor numbers increased 8.5% over the 2014 data – totaling more than 1735 individuals who gave the gift of sight in 2015. As you might suspect, there was also a corresponding increase in the number of tissues available for transplant and research purposes, swelling nearly 9% to almost 3500 tissues. Perhaps the most impressive areas of growth occurred in the processing department – *Lions VisionGift* often processes tissue for final use in one of three or four varying methods – seeing jumps of 30% in Descemet's Membrane Endothelial Keratoplasty (DMEK) preparation and 52% in halo Sterile Tissue Processing respectively. Even Descemet's Stripping Automated Endothelial Keratoplasty (DSAEK) numbers increased this year – this despite the fact that increasing DMEK and halo processing events 'cannibalize' potential DSAEK processing events.

The increase in our donor numbers and processing capabilities has necessitated the addition of new positions and work-breakdown structures, but also of key staff additions. Seeking to maximize an aspect of *Lions Vision-Gift's* competitive advantage, we recently hired a new Research and Development Specialist, Dr. Khoa Tran. His many years of research application at OHSU, coupled with a doctorate in cellular function, translate to a massive boost to our already stellar reputation for corneal science and publications. Additionally, we have added multiple positions to several departments this past year increasing the number of Eligibility Specialists and Tissue Distribution Specialists by one each, and adding another full-time Donor Specialist to the daily census. Even Regulatory Affairs and Human Resources added individuals this year to ensure we deliver the same service despite increased flow.

We took steps to improve another aspect of our emerging footprint by renovating our phlebotomy room to support our Autologous Serum Eye Drops (ASED) program by creating a more patient friendly room for blood draws. We've seen the success of our ASED program grow from a few dozen patients to more than 500 in the past three years, and we've had to add an extra day of appointments and hire an additional technician to make sure we're continuing to provide the safest and most effective products we can.

Lions VisionGift is rapidly approaching the point of diminishing growth in our service area. There are very few untapped referral sources like; hospitals, hospice, law enforcement, medical examiners, and skilled nursing facilities that don't already work with us, so it's not like we can create more referrals and donors in our area. We have perfected the techniques of processing thinner and thinner donor grafts, but we can't really get much thinner than where we are now. Halo Sterile Tissues gave us the opportunity to use much more tissue for transplant purposes than we used to, so now we're really maximizing the potential of the gifts we receive. Truthfully, the only way for us to continue the improvements of the past year is to continue growing our staff and facility and ultimately, our service area – which are all exciting opportunities for the coming year.



Another Successful Cornea Transplant

Some of you out there may be able to relate to the fairly unique circumstance of having contact with Lions VisionGift on a personal level, rather than as a Lion. Whether you have been the recipient of a corneal graft which Lions VisionGift has procured or processed, or if you have a connection to the organization as a donor family; there is something about the relationship to the eye bank that changes, just a little bit, when you are touched personally by our work.

I have worked at Lions VisionGift for more than eight years, and have experienced just about every facet of our operation. I began as a Donor Specialist – guiding families through the donation process – and bore witness to the remarkable strength and generosity of our donor families. I worked as an Eligibility Specialist with our surgeons which allowed me to gain a real appreciation for how much we are helping patients and the community. For the last four years, I have represented the eye bank to the public and our donation partners across the state, and I have witnessed, first-hand, the power and capabilities of committed medical professionals to improve transplant and donation into the future.

But, even with all hose varied experiences, the work we do found a new way to touch me, when my family was involved.

My father has Fuch's Dystrophy – which many of you know is a condition which left unchecked will cause cornea blindness. My father is an independent mining contractor who travels the world helping mines optimize their operations. A typical day on a mine would start around 6:00 am but Dad would have to get up at 2:00 to give his eyes enough time to clear the fluid that had built up. The condition had only been exacerbated in the past year.

As it turns out, my Father (who lives in Reno, NV) was referred to Dr. Jennifer Li at UC Davis in Sacramento. Now, that name may sound familiar to some of you because Dr. Li was a fellow at *Devers Eye Clinic* a couple of years ago under our Medical Director, Dr. Terry. As it turns out, Lions VisionGift still process the tissue for all of Dr. Li's DSAEK procedures – which is the preferred treatment for Fuch's

So it came to be that I saw my father's name on the Lions VisionGift surgery schedule. Having been in that department before, and knowing the immense quality that resides on our processing team, I couldn't have asked for anything more as a concerned son.

I guess I wanted to share this story with you because it surprised me how even someone who has seen most everything in the eye banking world could gain a new perspective by a personal interaction with our people. My father is doing fantastically; both his transplants have healed well and his vision in each eye has improved to 20/25... from 20/85. My father is terribly British, and in his typically understated manner he recently told me – succinct as you like – that the impact on his life and vision have been, "Astonishing!"

Thank you for helping my father, my family, and... for helping me gain an even greater appreciation for our mission, and for the small role I've played in giving this feeling to other families.

You, Me and Diabetes!

Hello Lions and family members.

I would like to apologize for a statement that I made in the January issue, because I stated that if you're physically able to get out and walk you should do so to keep the muscles in your legs from atrophying because when that happens we have a difficult time rising from a sitting position. This, in tourn, which causes us to start rocking such as a child on a rocking horse to gain enough momentum to rise. What I forgot to add is there is on the market equipment such as treadmills that accomplish the same results without having to go outside in the elements while at the same time allowing you to watch TV or read a book. This is much more comfortable and you are more likely to keep up the routine. Check with a local fitness center that might be able to help you select the proper equipment and/or set you up on a program. The following is a great article for diabetics. The following is a reprint of information that was provided by Walgreens in a publication called Answers at Walgreens.

The Dash Diet for People with Diabetes

This meal plan has been rated No. 1 four times. Is it right for you? By Toby Smithson, RDN, LDN, CDE

Have you heard of the DASH diet? DASH stands for Dietary Approaches to Stop Hypertension. Hypertension is another word for high blood pressure. Health experts in the U.S. News and World Report ranked the DASH diet the best overall diet for the last four years. The DASH diet was compared with 20 to 32 of the most popular diets during those years. The expert panel also ranked the DASH diet as the best diet for diabetes.

What is the Dash diet? The DASH diet was developed at the National Institutes of Health in an effort to lower high blood pressure. Researchers of the DASH diet found that eating foods that are high in potassium, calcium and magnesium and lower in sodium can help lower blood pressure. Better still, the DASH diet helps people who already have high blood pressure.

The Dash diet and diabetes: Besides lowering blood pressure, the DASH diet can lower cholesterol and even help lower fasting blood glucose and A1C levels in people with type 2 diabetes. Also, the DASH diet is easily adjusted for weight loss. The main benefit of the DASH diet for people with diabetes, however, is its ability to reduce the risk of heart attack and stroke.

What else do you need to know about the Dash diet? While whole grains, fruit, milk and yogurt, starchy vegetables and beans are healthy, they also contain carbohydrates. Therefore, it's important to plan your DASH diet with your diabetes menu in mind. Your dietitian can help make sure you get the right amount of carbohydrates while following the DASH eating plan. You can reap the benefits of the best diet for high blood pressure and diabetes at the same time.

According to the American Diabetes Association, "Two-out-of-three people with diabetes have high blood pressure, or take a blood pressure medicine."

2 Reasons People with Diabetes Need to Be Aware Of Blood Pressure Numbers

- 1. High blood pressure is two times as common among people with diabetes as it is among people without diabetes.
- 2. High blood pressure can lead to the same problems that result when diabetes is not controlled: heart attack, stroke and kidney failure if you have both diabetes and high blood pressure, it's very important to manage both conditions.



Both Katy and Colt were all smiles when posing for a picture and also finding out there was no referral this year with his glasses.

"Stories like this make it all worthwhile to drive through ice and snow at 5:30 am to get to the over 25 vision screenings for the Bend - La Pine School District this year," stated Central Oregon Vision Screening Coordinator Ted Carlin.

Lion Ted and his enthusiastic group of Lion volunteers from the Crooked River Ranch Lions, Three Sisters Lions, La Pine Lions, Bend Lions, Prineville Lions, Burns Lions and the Sherman County Lions will do vision screenings from the Warm Springs Reservation to Burns with many stops in between. They will end up screening over 11,000 students with an average referral rate of 9% or over 900 students possibly improving their success rate in school like Brennan.

Elgin Superintendent Addresses Lions

Dianne Greif, Superintendent of the Elgin School District, addressed three issues to the members of the Elgin Lions Club before having to leave for a board meeting.

"One of the issues that we are working together as a county is that of school safety," Dianne said, "and it is nice to work with the other superintendents and share ideas and resources." Dianne told the group that the FBI will be involved in formulating county-wide safety protocol. "If our kids are attending events at another county school and there is



a safety issue, then they will go through the same response that we have in our school." The superintendent said that another issue being addressed will be that of bullying. "It's nice to be working with various resources available through the committee. Specialists will be working with our playground personal to address the issues."

Another goal of the county-wide school committee is to work on similar curriculum. The committee of superintendents will focus on curriculum at the 7-12 grade levels. "In that way," Greif said, "if a student transfers schools within the county, they will be working on the same page. It really is exciting to work with the other superintendents."

The Superintendent was very excited to share the various grants received by the Elgin School District. "One of the grants we just received was for \$378,000, which will be used to revitalize our agricultural program. One of the first things we want to do is to add on to the agricultural building with shop space and develop our agricultural science lab with classes as demanding as our science program. The shop space will increase about one-third more to the area we have now." Dianne noted that another grant of \$9,600 will provide funding for a second greenhouse.

The school has also received notification of an \$80,000 construction grant allowing students to build a house within the community. "The winter months are used for inside construction such as wiring and cupboards. It probably won't be completed until next year, and then we plan to sell the structure and use funding to start another home." Greif said that part of the state goal is to have the 20% of students not going on to college to learn a trade and slide into the work force.

Dianne was excited that a \$75,000 grant was received to revitalize the kitchen area. "We just added a new 1,000 pound stove for the kitchen which has ten burners. It was difficult to move, but in our community just make a call and people come to help. We also plan to receive a new commercial steamer and cafeteria style mixer."

Reminding You Of An Option For Receiving *The Oregon Lion* Magazine

To: Lions of Multiple District 36

From: MD 36 Communications Committee

Re: **The Oregon Lion** and Budget Implications

The 2014-15 Council of Governors adopted the recommendations from the Communications Committee regarding *The Oregon Lion* magazine and its impact on the MD 36 Budget. With the continued loss of membership as well as escalating costs for print media, it was decided to eliminate three (3) of the eleven (11) printed issues of the magazine, saving approximately \$2,460 per issue. The net income from District Conference/Convention advertising as well as from Oregon Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation and Oregon Lions VisionGift comes to approximately \$10,700, while the costs for printing and mailing the eleven (11) issues of the magazine is budgeted at \$26,620. The 2014-15 budget predicted a shortfall of \$4,555. Elimination of the three (3) issues allowed savings of \$7,260, which gave the ability to add back some \$3,205 to be used for programs. The issues eliminated are October, March and June. The months of July/ August, September, November, December, January, February, April and May are still being published. All eleven (11) issues are available on the MD 36 website by the 5th of each month.

The Communications Committee also recommended that those willing to receive *The Oregon Lion* issues via the Website or via electronic means have the ability to indicate so by a check-off method. For each person so choosing, there will be a savings to the MD of \$0.61 per issue, which could be added to overall programs as *The Oregon Lion* printing and mailing budget would be thus reduced. Additionally, this check-off is being published in the magazine for several issues.

For those of you receiving the electronic version, your issue will not be sent in the form of an email. You will need to go to the website: md36lionsclubs.org and click on the list on the left that reads: *THE OREGON LION* MAGAZINE ARCHIVES. Look for the current month issue.

29th Annual Lions International Peace Poster Contest



Sponsor a Lions International Peace Poster Contest and join clubs worldwide in sharing children's visions of peace with your community.

How the Contest Works

Only a Lions club can sponsor the contest in a local school or organized youth group. The contest is open to students 11-13 on November 15, 2016. Participating students are asked to create posters visually depicting the contest theme, "A Celebration of Peace."

One winner for each contest sponsored by a club is chosen to advance to the district governor for judging. On the district level, one winner is selected to go on to the multiple district competition and from there one winner is forwarded to International Headquarters for the final judging. Entries are judged at all levels on originality, artistic merit and portrayal of

During the final judging, 23 merit award winners and one grand prize winner are chosen to represent the many entries submitted from around the world.

Awards

Artists of posters advancing to the final international judging are recognized as follows:

- International Grand Prize Winner receives a trip to an award ceremony where he/she will receive a cash award of US\$5,000 (or local equivalent) and an engraved plaque. 
