The Unique and Special Gift

Tanya's mother, Loretta, got the phone call not long after leaving the hospital soon after her daughter passed away. It was a Donation Specialist from Lions VisionGift calling her to discuss the potential of cornea donation. The family had never considered the issue of cornea donation prior to that day, but as Loretta said, "Tanya was so unique, we didn't give it a thought".

A week later, on April 10th at Legacy Good Samaritan in Portland, both of Tanya's corneas were successfully transplanted to two people who were grateful for her gift of sight.



As a child, Tanya spent the first year of her life in and out of the Children's Orthopedic Hospital in Seattle. Her family located in Vancouver, WA made the long drive back and forth many times. In those early years, they were told by specialists at the hospital that Tanya was likely to only live until the age of twelve. In the end, Tanya surprised everyone, and she lived a spirited life filled with love until she was 50 years old. When it came to outliving the doctor's expectations, as Loretta puts it, "She really fooled them. She was a special child."

Although Tanya was small in stature, generally weighing between 55-65 lbs., her eyes were big, blue and beautiful. And while she was non-verbal in her communication, her gift of sight speaks loudly about her giving heart and her family's generosity.

The loss of Tanya will always be heavy on the hearts of her family, but when thinking about her daughter's final act of donation, her mother doesn't hesitate to say, "It is heartfelt knowing that a small part of her is still living on. It is always a good feeling to help others."

Loretta was right, Tanya was indeed a special child.

Lions VisionGift is dedicated to advancing transplantation, research and education to honor donors and their gifts of sight. Since its inception in 1975, over 40,000 people have received the gift of sight from tissue procured and screened by Lions VisionGift. Additionally, thousands of gifts have been utilized for ocular research and surgical training. Lions VisionGift has locations in both Portland, Oregon and Boston, Massachusetts.

You, Me and the D!

Hello Everyone,

Welcome to my world! Won't you come on in? Following is an article about how to get a handle on carbohydrates for better glucose control.

Go Low: How much and which kinds? Get a handle on carbohydrates for better glucose control.

Everyone needs carbohydrates – even people with diabetes. Without them, your body wouldn't have the fuel it needs to function. But all carbs aren't created equal, and it's easy to overdo some of them. While most people should be paying some attention to carbs, people with diabetes ought to know a few more details because "when you eat carbohydrates, blood sugar levels rise," explains registered dietitian Lori Zanini, CDE, author of the *Diabetes Cookbook* and *Meal Plan for the Newly Diagnosed*. Here are some key carb facts to know.

There are three types

Yes, starches like bread and pasta are carbs, but that's not all. Sugars, including added and natural ones, are also carbs. Fiber is a carb, too.

"Anyone with diabetes needs to be aware of the amount and quality of carbs" he or she eats, says Zanini. "Examples of good sources of carbohydrates include non-starchy vegetables, fruit, whole grains, lentils, beans, nuts, seeds, and some dairy. Poor choices would be things like processed and refined grains, sugar-sweetened beverages, and packaged desserts."

Some people with diabetes should count carbs

There's no one-size-fits-all diet for people with diabetes. "People with uncontrolled diabetes and those requiring the use of insulin would benefit the most from `carb counting,' since the amount of insulin used is often dependent on the amount of carbohydrates consumed," says Zanini.

If you're not counting carbs, it's still smart to limit your intake of starches and sugars. One easy way to do that is to simply fill half your plate with non-starchy vegetables, such as broccoli, onions and spinach. Grains and other starches should take up a quarter. The remaining quarter is for protein.

Carbs aren't always easy to spot

Zanini says that her patients often turn out to be eating twice as many carbs as they think they are. Even if you've scaled back on starches, watch out for sneaky sources. "Many people are surprised by how many carbohydrates are in condiments and marinades like ketchup, teriyaki sauce, marinara sauce, BBQ sauce, and bottled dressings," she says. "Other surprisingly high-carb foods are sweetened coffee drinks, cocktails, smoothie bowls, kombucha and flavored yogurts."

Don't go too low on carbs

A low-carb diet may help you lose weight, but you need to be a little cautious. If you have diabetes and want to cut carbs, Zanini suggests limiting them to about 45% of your total daily calories. "This is lower than the standard `acceptable range' of 45% to 65% of calories from carbs for the average healthy adult, yet not so low that hypoglycemia or nutrient deficiencies could be an issue," says Zanini.

Imagine being surrounded by over 20 vintage aircraft, most of them World War II era and most in flying condition as you listen to Alison Perry, founder of the Central Oregon Veteran's Ranch, describe the concept and development of the Ranch. The Central Oregon Veteran's Ranch (COVR) is a 19 acre working farm in a rustic setting that brings veterans of different generations together in the natural environment where they can heal each other and heal together. Perry will be the keynote speaker for the opening of the District G Convention March 1st in Madras, Oregon.

Beginning at 4:30 p.m. tours of the museum will be offered with Social Hour starting at 5:00 p.m. We will be entertained by the Box Canyon Bluegrass Band. Madras Lions Club President Christy Brown is a member of the band. The convention will open at 6:00 p.m. followed by dinner, special music by Crooked River Ranch Lion Michelle Shank and featured speakers.

It started with a few Oregon Lions discussing the possibility of helping people in need receive eye surgery and it led to the establishment of a 501 (C) 3 organization based in a small office at a Portland hospital. Our programs have grown considerably, but two things haven't changed since 1959: Your Oregon Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation still provides the gift of sight through critical surgery and treatment and we're still located at Legacy Good Samaritan Hospital in NW Portland.

The Early Years

Thanks to OLSHF historian Des Howarth we know that "While most Clubs had for several years been promoting sight programs with their annual White Cane drives, during the late 1960's enthusiasm for the new Foundation increased, Clubs stepped up their tempo for not only White Cane Days but also other fundraisers solely for the Foundation."

"The Foundation's early ties with the Devers Eye Clinic and the need for clinical research grants provided an impetus for increasing support by the scores of Lions Clubs which were joining into the OLSHF partnership. Trustees were visiting Lions Clubs regularly with slide presentations, especially highlighting the work being carried on at the Devers clinic. Although Lions Clubs continued support for blind programs, by the 1970's emphasis on prevention of blindness became the chief fundraising motive for Lions in MD-36."

"By 1970 the annual OLSHF presentation of the year's activities followed by the Parade of Checks had become one of the highlights of every MD-36 Convention. A great majority of

Lions Clubs participated, not only in providing large sums of money for the Foundation, but also in making their presentation in a most unusual manner (The Eugene Downtown Lions often were the most energetic in both categories, but the Lloyd Lions' presentation of 30 one hundred dollar bills pinned on a large pair of eyeglasses was one of the most original.)

"By 1972, it was becoming evident that the resources of the Devers Clinic, which had been established by the late Arthur Devers, would soon be inadequate to meet the needs of its expanding program. Because of the clinic's reputation as a research institution and the related services it was able to supply, doctors from many western states were referring more patients than the clinic could reasonably accommodate. Thus a backlog of more than two months developed for patients in need. Additional space was vital. Lions in Oregon responded by providing money, plumbing supplies, and equipment for the first expansion of the clinic, a new 900 square foot front wing for Devers and the Oregon Lions Sight Foundation."

Next Month: We'll continue telling the story of the growth of OLSHF through the 1970's and into the 1980's.

We're looking forward to celebrating the Foundation's 60 years of Service throughout 2019. At every Lions Convention this winter and spring, at our Keep the Promise events, and at our annual Gala in November, we'll share stories of "keeping the promise" of restoring sight and hearing for those in need throughout Oregon and northern California.


