

Taking this project a step beyond, Ms. Forshee's class wrote paragraphs about the leader who inspired them.



Girl Scout Aine Maher, from Girl Scout Troop 12302 was the winner for Waldport Lions Club. Her entry was sent on to compete with other entries regionally.

2nd place- Emery who was inspired by Harvey Milk. "Harvey Milk was a compassionate activist for the LGBTQ community in 1977. He fought for the LGBTQ+ civil and human rights. He believed that the government should represent all the citizens of that community. Milk fought with compassion for discrimination in housing and employment. Milk also helped create the first ever pride flag. His goal was for everyone to show respect to the LGBTQ+ community. For them to have equality and equal rights.
