SOARING BEYOND THE HORIZON AS "WE SERVE"

Last month in my article, I talked about leadership and spoke about Northwest Lions Leadership Institute and its value to all Lions as a way to learn and grow. As we approach the date of the institute of April 26-28, I urge anyone who has not had the opportunity to attend to consider doing so. The cost is very reasonable at \$290 and includes registration, meals, materials and lodging and, in addition, each district has some training funds available to assist you. To get an application please contact PCC Vince Bishop or CC Gail Black.

This month I would like to focus on Our International President's New Voices Initiative. The write up states: "The New Voices **Initiative** was created to amplify the stories of those working to support women in our clubs and districts. As we celebrate our first female International President, New Voices supports stronger gender equality in Lions leadership." So, whether you are currently in a leadership role or have not yet decided to pursue that, there are a number of webinars which speak to the subject and are available for your review through the LCI website and will help you to gain more insight. The last one in February was: The Other Perspective: Men Empowering Women in Leadership. Coming up on March 21 (which you can register for) is Why We Need the Women's Initiative. Then please don't forget The Women's Symposium 2019 is scheduled for May 9, 2019 from 4:00pm - 7:00pm at the Riverbend Annex, 123 International Way, Springfield, OR 97477.

Do you remember way back when there was a Virginia Slims cigarette commercial on TV that said, "You've Come a long way Baby"? Well, yes indeed we have come a long way. Women always have had a part in Lionism by virtue of the Lioness clubs but not as a member of a Lions club. Then in 1987 at the International Convention in Saipan, Taiwan, the Lions lifted the 70-year old ban to exclude women as members. Of the 5,100 delegates who voted, 77% voted in favor of an amendment to the constitution removing the stipulation that members be male. And yes, we have come a long way since then-but we do still a ways to go.

We in the United States do have better women representation in our clubs than overseas, but we certainly are not up to a 50-50% rate as yet. The 12- 31, 2018, records from LCI show that District O has 39.96% women, District R - 38.42%, District E - 35.02%, and District G – 38.59%. Our district governors are working diligently to increase the women representation in our clubs as they continue to "Look Beyond the Horizon".





You, Me and the D!

Hello Everyone,

Welcome to my world! Won't you come on in? Following is an article that reminds us to be honest with our health care providers.

Real Talk It can be tempting to gloss over the truth with your medical team. Here's a case for staying honest.

You're at your appointment, and your endocrinologist or diabetes educator starts asking questions: How are your blood sugars? What are you eating for breakfast? How many times a week do you exercise? If you ever skip your meds or your walk, or your breakfasts are heavy on the doughnuts, you might feel the urge to respond with a fib or two.

But Elizabeth Halprin, MD, endocrinologist and clinical director of adult diabetes at Joslin Diabetes Center in Boston, makes the case for telling the truth. "It doesn't help a patient to tell me what they think I want to hear," she says. "You lose the opportunity for me to make recommendations based on your reality."

Here are three topics where it's useful to be honest with your medical team, Halprin says.

Diet. This is a hot-button topic, Halprin acknowledges. "There's a lot of emotion and guilt around food," she says. But leveling with your health care provider about what you usually eat and drink allows her to suggest small tweaks – say, giving up that glass of juice at breakfast – that can make a big difference in how you feel.

Similarly, it helps to be honest about how often you imbibe. "Alcohol does affect diabetes medications and increases the risk of hypoglycemia," Halprin says. "Sometimes I will simply recommend that you eat food while drinking."

Medication. Maybe you skip doses of insulin or take smaller amounts than prescribed. It's risky to stay mum on this. "If your blood glucose levels are very high, our tendency as clinicians is to increase your medication," Halprin says. "That leads us to add medications when they may not be necessary." Another possible scenario: You're unexpectedly admitted to the hospital and given the full dose your doctor intended. "This can lead to very low blood sugars because you're not used to getting your actual dose," Halprin adds.

She notes that cost is an all-too-common barrier to taking meds as prescribed. But your doctor may be able to switch you to a different medication covered by your insurance. Or you may be eligible for patient assistance programs run by pharmaceutical companies. Your physician must know you need help to sign you up.

Exercise. Physical activity increases insulin sensitivity and lowers your blood sugar levels. Over time, regular exercise can reduce your AIC. If you're not already exercising, a good health care provider will help you brainstorm creative ways to get moving (the 10-minute dance party!), and troubleshoot problems such as joint pain that may be getting in your way.

If you really can't level with your physician about these or other topics, it may be time to make a switch. "If you feel like you can't be honest, or you're being judged," Halprin says, "then you need a different doctor."

The following statistics illustrate an important need right here in Oregon:

- 25% of all children have an undiagnosed vision problem
- Children that do not see well tend to
- have difficulty reading at grade level Third graders not reading at 3rd grade level are 13 times less likely to graduate high school than those that do
- Oregon ranks 48th out of 50 states in high school graduation rate

There is a need for identifying children that do not see well, and as Lions, there is something that we can do about it. We can support legislation that will increase public funding for vision screening in Oregon schools and we can all join together in Salem on April 24th at the State Capitol to rally around this cause. **Lions Day at the Capitol** is our opportunity to ask state legislators to support vision screening in Oregon schools and to help our children see, learn, read, graduate, and lead a life full of potential.

This is one of the rare bi-partisan issues that has support on both sides of the aisle and in both the House and the Senate. It is not controversial and not political. It simply is a childhood health issue that was addressed in 2017 and funding needs to be sustained into the future for children in Oregon.

A Mother's Vision Restored

When Norma came to the Patient Care Program, she suffered from keratoconus, a progressive eye condition that causes the cornea to thin and bulge, leading to blindness. Cross linking surgery restores vision and is a less invasive and less expensive way to stop the condition and avoid a painful corneal transplant, but is not currently covered by insurance.

Norma had already received one surgery, but her vision in her untreated eye was worsening. Thanks to the Patient Care Program, Norma received crucial help and surgery with Dr. Mark Terry at Devers Eye Institute.

With a young family to care for in Seaside, Norma was able to receive this minimally-invasive procedure from Dr. Terry in Portland and return home the same day.

This was not the first time the services of the Lions helped her family. "The Lions helped me when I was a teenager and needed eyeglasses," says Norma. "Now as an adult, they are helping to save my vision! Thank you Lions, I am so grateful!" The School Vision Screening program also screened her children's vision at Seaside Heights Elementary School last fall.
