At this time, it does appear that the "Ah Ha Moment" stories will be collected and judged in a different way than previously planned. Perhaps DG Bob Chaney will find a way to assemble the book of stories into which he has put so very much planning time or perhaps the project will continue through the next Lions year. In either case, I want to share my story with you here, because we all need to read something to lift our hearts just a bit!

"Have you ever seen a vision impaired little guy just light up with excitement? I had the pleasure of watching Cody, a third grader living with albinism, do just that. Along with some

of the Oregon Lions Sight and Hearing staff, I was privileged to watch Dr. J. P. Lowery, the OLSHF Low Vision specialist, as he worked with kids in his traveling clinic, in this case an unoccupied classroom. Cody could not see the white board at the front of the classroom, even with his eyeglass correction. Dr. Lowery fitted his need by providing Cody with a monocular scope, an instrument much like one half of a pair of binoculars. It was just amazing and incredibly heartwarming, to see the 8 year old's response when he put the monocular up to his best eye. He even got up and went to the back of the classroom to test his vision with the new instrument's help, excitedly laughing and telling us that now he could sit anywhere he wanted in the classroom! And, just so happy, he told Dr. Lowery and we Lions, that this was so cool and that he'd be the only kid with a space age scope! That was the day when I became a Lion in my heart."



Halo sterile tissue, developed at LVG, is shelf-stable and can be stored at room temperature. It is ready to use and requires no rinsing or rehydration, making it ideal for both emergency procedures and scheduled surgeries.



This past week, we received a generous donation of face masks from a surgeon we work with in Hong Kong, Dr. Arthur Cheng. After receiving this amazing gift, our VP of Surgical Services coordinated a drop-off with Mutlnomah County to make sure to they'd be able to distribute 700 masks as they saw fit. In addition, two boxes of masks went to the Old Town Clinic of Central City Concern, which offers healthcare services for more vulnerable populations. Exercise Tips for Diabetes

Do you have type 1 or type 2 diabetes? If so you are not alone. In the U.S. alone there are more than 30 million people who live with these disorders. One way to manage this disease is to adopt a regular physical exercise routine. Movement helps control your symptoms from damaging internal organs. Are you ready to sweat? If so, read on to discover several exercise tips for those with diabetes:

- 1. Take a walk, if you feel intimidated by the many machines, instead of buying a membership, take a walk around your block. A stroll is simple, plus all you need is a good pair of shoes. Walking is an aerobic activity that raises the heartbeat which can lower resistance to the hormone that regulates glucose and hemoglobin A1c levels. Plus people who walk at least 2 hours per week are less likely to have heart disease. You can cut your risk even more by walking 3-4 hours per week.
- 2. Strength Training, also called resistance training, helps you build muscle. You can perform this task with handheld weights, stretch bands or your own body. As a bonus, this activity will help you with everyday day tasks such as climbing stairs, lifting heavy objects and walking. Studies show that strength training is as effective as aerobic exercise when it comes to improving how your body uses the hormone that regulates glucose in the blood. For those with diabetes, it can also aid in blood sugar control and weight loss.
- 3. Always stay hydrated. Everyone who exercises needs to drink plenty of water. If you have type 1 or 2 diabetes, dehydration is often associated with erratic blood sugar levels and heat stroke. To stay safe, bring along a bottle wherever you go and remember to take sips before, during, and after any activity. Sometimes, it can be hard to tell if your body needs water. Some common symptoms include headache, dry mouth, thirst, dizziness and dark colored urine.
- **4. Perform a warm up**. Exercise is great for the body. If you jump into it too quickly, however, you can injure your muscles. Before starting any exercises, perform a warm up routine. According to experts warming up before physical activity will prepare your heart, lungs and muscles for the upcoming exertion.
- **5. Exercise in increments**. If you try to jog for 60 minutes straight you may find yourself huffing and puffing, unable to go on. Instead of pushing yourself, try to break up physical activity into manageable segments. For instance a 15 minute yoga routine in the morning, go for a brisk walk around the workplace in the afternoon and possibly swim a few laps in the pool at the end of the day.
- 6. Other possible ideas would be:
 - **Practicing Tai Chi**, according to studies those with type 2 diabetes can benefit significantly from tai chi as the exercise improves blood glucose levels and immune system response.
 - **Dancing to music**. Dancing is a great way to increase your heartbeat, work up a sweat and burn calories. It's essential to stop if you injure yourself or feel any pain. High blood sugar levels prevent healing, meaning those with diabetes can suffer consequences from exercising.
 - **Find a friend**. It can be hard to work up the motivation to work out, especially when you're doing so alone. According to one study, 95% of people who start a weight loss program with friends compete it, compared to 75% who chose to work out alone.
 - Join a Yoga class. Studies show taking a yoga class leads to fewer depressive symptoms no matter if you work out once a week or five times a week.
 - Lastly, keep a log. Exercise, no matter the type is a key factor in preventing cancer. Unfortunately, those with diabetes, especially type 2, are at a higher risk of developing various cancers. If you hit the gym, mark it down, along with the type exercise you perform.


Spreading a Little Christmas

Bill Miller Guest Speaker at Elgin Lions




Bill Miller answers questions from the Lions

Miller, a graduate of Elgin High School, served in the US Air Force, volunteered for the Union County Search and Rescue. served as an Elgin ambulance driver and in the Elgin rural fire Department, was an Elgin Police Reserve Officer, a Sheriff Reserve Deputy, and currently is a Sargent of the Union County Sheriff's Department. Miller answered many questions from the Lions including viewpoints on gun carry issues, drug prevalence in the area, funding for the Sheriff's office, re-instating the Reserve program and if a new jail should be built in Union County.

In other action, Sight and Hearing Chair Keith Warren indicated that the year has started similar to the previous, with requests for 5 pairs of glasses to date. The Lions also heard of the success of two trailer loads of emergency supplies sent by the Elgin Lions. The second trailer was taken to Pendleton by Lions David Fuhrman and Lynn Knapp. President Kathy Oliver noted that the club is still receiving donations to stencil the large trailer with the Lion insignia. To date, \$1,300 has been donated for the project.

WE ARE NOT IN THE SAME BOAT ...



I heard we are all in the same boat, but it's not like that. We are in the same storm, but not in the same boat. Your ship could be shipwrecked and mine might not be. Or vice versa.

For some, quarantine is optimal. A moment of reflection, of re-connection, easy in flip flops, with a cocktail or coffee. For others, this is a desperate financial & family crisis.

For some that live alone, they're facing endless loneliness. While for others it is peace, rest & time with their mother, father, sons & daughters.

With the \$600 weekly increase in unemployment some are bringing in more money to their households than when they were working. Others are working more hours for less money, due to pay cuts or loss in sales.

Some families of 4 just received \$3400 from the stimulus, while other families of 4 saw \$0.

Some were concerned about getting a certain candy for Easter, while others were concerned if there would be enough bread, milk and eggs for the weekend.

Some want to go back to work because they don't qualify for unemployment, and are running out of money. Others are enraged at those who break the quarantine.

Some are home spending 2-3 hours/day helping their child with online schooling, while others are spending 2-3 hours/day to educate their children, on top of a 10-12 hour workday.

Some have experienced the near death of the virus, some have already lost someone from it, and some are not sure if their loved ones are going to make it. Others don't believe this is a big deal.

Some have faith in God and expect miracles during this 2020. Others say the worst is yet to come.

So, friends, we are NOT in the same boat. We are going through a time when our perceptions and needs are completely different. Each of us will emerge, in our own way, from this storm. It is very important to see beyond what is seen at first glance. Not just looking, actually seeing.

We are all on different ships during this storm experiencing a very different journey.

Compassion is key.

Let it be your guide.

Greetings OLSHF Board, Staff & Friends,

We wanted to provide an update on what is happening with your Oregon Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation as we near the end of our fourth week of social distancing in the wake of the COVID-19 outbreak.

Oregon Schools Closed For Balance of School Year Last week, Oregon Governor Kate Brown announced that Oregon public school will not reopen this school year, meaning OLSHF's School Vision Screening Program will not screen more students until next fall.

With vision screenings curtailed, we'll end the year having screened 181,000 students during the 2019-2020 school year. This is over 300% of the number of students that we used to screen as little as six years ago, so it is still a significant number of students and something to be proud of. We are now scheduling vision screenings for the 2020-2021 school year and the schools that had their screenings scheduled will be given priority for dates this Fall.

Thank You to Corvallis Lion Fred Hirsch

Sadly, long time Corvallis Lion Fred Hirsch passed away in 2019. A quiet man at times, Fred is remembered for being "a real life Yoda, a quizzical man.. with the most surprising abilities" Corvallis Lion Skip Volkmann tells us.

Fred also had the ability to leave a legacy. This week we received a six figure bequest from Fred's estate, a timely gift in lieu of current circumstances. OLSHF's policy for bequests is to invest these funds in the Foundation's long term investment funds at the end of each fiscal year, providing that revenue has exceeded expenses for the year. If not, the Board may designate to use some or all of the bequest to offset a deficit.

For those not aware, the Foundation does provide at no cost an Estate Planning Guide and also offers free estate planning consultation with Gene Christian, one of the premier estate planning professionals in the NW. Please let me know if you are interested in any of these resources.


Excerpt From A Letter Received From a Parent This Month:

Council Chair-Elect Voting to go Online

Greetings fellow Lions-

With the cancelation of the MD 36 convention in May, the election of our 2021 Council Chair-Elect will have to be done online this year. The Lions in Wisconsin have been using a program/website called "Electionrunner.com". They have been happy with it, and following a successful test election ballot sent out to some of our Lions leadership, it will be the way we run this online election.

The process will start with a letter being sent via the US mail to each of the club secretaries. This letter will inform the club of the number of voting delegates that their club is entitled to based on the membership numbers on April 1st of those who have been members of their respective club for a year and a day.

This next step is the key to a successful election!! Given their club's number of delegates, the club secretary will need to email me, Jim Vincent, the Credentials Chair, the names and email addresses of their club's voting delegates. While Electionrunner will notify us if an email address is rejected, I ask that the club secretaries be very careful to give me correct names and email addresses. The email address to where the delegate information is to be sent will be md36election@msn.com. I will then input these names and email addresses into the database.

When the election is launched, each voter will get an email from Electionrunner that includes their own unique clickable link to log in and vote the Council Chair-Elect ballot. The voter can vote using their phone, tablet, or computer simply by clicking on this link. They vote, hit the send button, and Electionrunner tabulates their secret ballot. Election runner then provides us with the results. **No one** can see how any of the voters has cast their ballot.

The Myrtle Creek Lions Club has sent a letter of Nomination endorsing DG Bob Chaney for Council Chair-Elect. It was received by Council Chair Sharon Rollins and Executive Director Vince Bishop. It was read by Council Chair Sharon Rollins at the last Council of Governors Meeting.

Here are key dates regarding the election:

Mon. April 26	Delegate Letters go out via USPS to club secretaries.
Sun. May 10	Delegate names and email addresses due to Credentials Chair Jim Vincent.
Mon. May 18	Voting begins at 6PM with Electionrunner emailing ballots to delegates.
Thurs. May 21	Voting Ends at 6PM.
