CELEBRATING WOMEN IN LIONS

Last year was the 30th anniversary of the official admission of women into Lions Clubs. We can celebrate the work that women do in our clubs and for our community. The Portland Lloyd Lions Club worked hard in the 1980s to sue LCI to admit women into Lions Clubs. A big ROAR for the Lloyd Lions!

Today, some clubs in District O have more women members than men including the West Linn Riverview Lions, Oaks Bottom Lions, the Gresham Supper Club, King City Club, Lake Oswego Lions, Milwaukie Lions and the Portland Legacy Club. And there are many clubs with over 25% women members. At the international level, our organization has about 23% women members and that number is increasing each vear.

To create a positive environment in your club you might consider some of the suggestions of Sarah Khan, a professional speaker about building positive communication. She suggests:

- Letting go of being right and that the other person is wrong.
- When in discussion, use "yes and" instead of "but I."
- · Walking your message.
- · Focusing on serving and helping others.

As Lions, it's important that we remember that the skills our members bring to our organization and to our mission of service are as varied as they are numerous. No two people are the same. Our abilities, attitudes and preferences differ from person to person and to expect every Lion to function in the same way and produce the same results that others do is as futile as it is unfair to the Lion volunteer. Good Lion leaders understand this instinctively and they explore ways to utilize the strengths of their volunteers while being considerate of their personal needs and comfort levels.

Hands-on service to others is a case in point. Not all Lions are comfortable performing hands-on service with strangers at the outset. Language barriers, the fear of making mistakes and perceived personal shortcomings can not only make the process of providing assistance to others difficult, but, in some cases, can prevent people from stepping up to serve in the first place. Without a certain amount of help, personal limitations will, in most cases, trump guarantees of success and promises of rewards to be garnered from being part of helping people in need. Our comfort zone is a powerful driving force which can override all other considerations if we fail to respect it.

My point here is that we need to be aware of this heading into an activity. Find out what your volunteers would like to do and what, if anything, they would prefer not to do. If your staffing permits it, allow them to do what they feel comfortable doing. Short of that, ease them into their assigned position and spend extra time with them until you are satisfied that they are satisfied with the duties of their assignment. A little planning and consideration here will go a long way toward a successful team effort which produces successful results.

The good news here is that Lions, for the most part, are pretty understanding and forgiving people. We do, however, have some "driven" members who have their own ideas on how to do things and what constitutes success. Success, now and in the future, depends on our ability to understand and utilize the talents of all our people. One of the four goals of the LCI Forward Plan is improving the value of membership in the Lions. Consideration for our members and recognition of the value of their contributions to everything we do goes a long way toward enhancing the value of their membership in the Lions.

I would be willing to bet that, if we could separate the Active and Book numbers and take a look at the new members that have joined over the last five years, you would see a positive net gain for all Districts not just E. This excites me because it shows that we are once again on the rise and soon, very soon I hope, you will see our overall numbers begin to shift from a negative to a positive. There you have my dissertation for the numbers for this month.

What's on the horizon? Well, we have the Multiple District Convention coming up this month. This is the culmination and celebration of our achievements for this year as a Multiple District. Greetings Fellow Lions,

With all the District Conventions behind us, everyone should be rested up and hopefully back to normal by now. I am always so pumped after attending a convention. I always learn something new or a better way of doing a project or fundraiser. Having so much fun while seeing old friends and making new ones warms my heart.

While working with the Milton Freewater Lions Club for several years at their major fundraiser, I often heard them talk about how the Lions were an extended family. It kind of went in one ear and out the other until I finally gave in to my Mother and joined the Weston-McEwen Club. It took going to my first convention to realize that Lions are family and we should all be doing everything we can to get others to join. If we were all to follow PDG George Sahlberg's example and 'just ask' people to join, we might be able to get back to the 1250 members that we need to keep our District going. For those of you who don't know, George has personally sponsored 129 members. He has been a Lion for 38 years, which means he has sponsored at least 3 or 4 people each year. You, Me and the D!

Hello Everyone,

Welcome to my world! Won't you come on in?

I'm really excited about an article that was recently sent to me from Mike Green, an Oregon Junior Chamber International (JCI) Senator who frequently distributes items of interest to other JCI Senators. The subject is about avoiding heart attacks and strokes with water and aspirin. Diabetics are two or more times likely to have a heart attack or stroke then non-diabetics. So pay attention to the following advice and increase the odds of being heart attack and stroke free. Sounds like a winner to me.

Subject: Fwd: Water and Aspirin...Good to Know!

How many folks do you know who say they don't want to drink anything before going to bed because they'll have to get up during the night? **Answer from a Mayo Cardiologist**: heart attacks can be triggered by dehydration. Drinking one glass of water before going to bed avoids stroke or heart attack. **Interesting.......**

Why do people need to urinate so much at night time? **Answer from my Cardiac Doctor:** Gravity holds water in the lower part of your body when you are upright (legs swell). When you lie down and the lower body (legs and etc.) seeks level with the kidneys, it is then that the kidneys remove the water because it is easier. I knew you need your minimum water to help flush the toxins out of your body, but this was news to me.

Correct time to drink water... Very Important. From A Cardiac Specialist!

Drinking water at a certain time maximizes its effectiveness on the body:

2 glasses of water after waking up - helps activate internal organs

1 glass of water 30 minutes before a meal - helps digestion

1 glass of water before taking a bath - helps lower blood pressure

1 glass of water before going to bed - avoids stroke or heart attack

I can also add to this... My Physician told me that water at bed time will also help prevent night time leg cramps. Your leg muscles are seeking hydration when they cramp and wake you up with a Charlie Horse.

Mayo Clinic Cardiologist on Aspirin -

Most heart attacks occur in the day, generally between 6 A.M. and noon. Having one during the night, when the heart should be most at rest, means that something unusual happened. Research is being done that points to sleep apnea as the cause.

If you take an aspirin or a baby aspirin once a day, take it at night. **The Reason:** Aspirin has a 24-hour "half-life"; therefore, if most heart attacks happen in the wee hours of the morning, the Aspirin would be strongest in your system. **FYI:** Bayer is making crystal aspirin to dissolve instantly on the tongue. They work much faster than the tablets...

Why keep Aspirin by your bedside? <u>It's about Heart Attacks</u> The majority of people (about 60%) who had a heart attack during their sleep did not wake up. However, if it occurs, the chest pain may wake you up from your deep sleep. If that happens, immediately dissolve two aspirins in your mouth and swallow them with a bit of water. <u>Afterwards</u>: - Call **911**. - Phone a neighbor or a family member who lives very close by. Say "Heart Attack!" - Say that you have taken 2 Aspirins. - Take a seat on a chair or sofa near the front door, and wait for their arrival andDO NOT LIE DOWN!

Note: There are other symptoms of a heart attack, besides the pain on the left arm. One must also be aware of an intense pain on the chin, as well as nausea and lots of sweating; however, these symptoms may also occur less frequently and there may be NO pain in the chest during a heart attack.

A Cardiologist has stated that if each person after reading, sends it to 10 people, probably one life could be saved! I have already shared this information. What about you?

Such a person was Lion Annie Harris of the Eugene Downtown Lions Club. She fits our description perfectly. She worked hard, scorned recognition, and was a model of humility.

Life did not deal Lion Annie a winning hand. Her father was always seeking a better situation and moved repeatedly, forcing Lion Annie to attend eleven different schools. She finally dropped out of high school to get married, later divorcing her abusive husband. Later, she married for a second time and had similar results. She ended up raising four children as a single mother, completing an education to be a medical records transcriber and ultimately heading the medical records department of a hospital!

All of this success was despite the fact that she was well under five feet tall, overweight, and eventually became legally blind.

It was at this point that Lion Annie became a member of the Eugene Downtown Club. The qualities which, brought her success in the world of work, made her the truly great Lion that she was.

Lion Annie was willing to do any job that she was able to do. For instance, she was a regular on an outdoor project keeping a small corner park groomed and clean. The park has a wooden kiosk with a bulletin board where the community can post notices. It rapidly accumulates staples. Every time the Club did the project, Lion Annie stood on a stool for two hours with a flat-blade screwdriver and pliers, removing the staples. This was a tedious and tiring job, but it needed doing and Lion Annie was able to do it. She did it without complaint.

Lion Annie was also a very effective seller of Club raffle tickets. She ran the weekly raffle with a drawing at each meeting. She was also a dependable ticket seller for our summer raffle, working alone or with a partner, selling tickets outdoors in two-hour shifts. Again, she did this without complaint.

Another quality an ideal Lion ought to possess is a cheerful spirit. Doing service work grudgingly or with a stream of complaints certainly does not fit the spirit of Lionism. Lion Annie Harris never complained and got true enjoyment out of her Lion activities. If a fellow Lion ribbed her about being vertically challenged, she laughed along with the group

and took no offense. Every time life dealt her another bad card, she simply accepted it and moved on.

Does Lionism turn us into Lion Annie's kind of person or do people like Lion Annie gravitate toward Lions? It is probably a little of both. Lions is not an organization that draws glory seekers. Some of the best and most highly esteemed Lions do not seek the limelight. The satisfaction comes for most of us when we realize that our clubs make a positive difference in the communities we serve and in the wider world. That satisfaction seems to have been all Lion Annie needed.

As Lion Annie approached the end of her life, her personality and approach to life did not change. She contacted active Lions to make sure the things she was working on got finished and that she returned things that belonged to the Club.

So, looking at Lion Annie's time as a Lion, we can draw a good portrait of what a good Lion ought to be. We can strive to serve others, live life without complaint, and seek no reward for the work we do. We can aspire to be the kind of Lion that Annie Harris was.



In addition, the Club has collaborated with the Oregon State Fire Marshal and the Pendleton Fire Department on a focused effort in a low-income area of the city to ensure each residence has a working smoke alarm. Last October, Club members, local volunteers, and members of the Fire Department installed 50 smoke alarms in this area of town in one weekend.

East Albany Lions Club Reveals New Face of Lions

The more things change the more they stay the same, so the old saying goes. An example of this is how two local families have both changed and been changed by their involvement with the East Albany Lions Club. What used to be a Club where dad or grandpa disappeared for two to three evenings per month for Club meetings with some fundraisers and community work projects thrown in has transformed into more of a family business.

Long known as the world's largest service club, the Lions Club has just turned the corner into its second century. As it matures in striving to meet growing needs, the organization is witnessing an increase in female membership as well as multiple generation families serving together. The new Lions Club features among other changes to its demographics, husbands and wives serving their communities together. Another wrinkle in the evolution of the East Albany Club is that it features not one, but two active three-generation families.

Lion Jerry Boehme is the middle generation in one of these families. Lion Jerry joined the East Albany Club in 1984. He was greatly influenced about the idea of community service and sold on the value of civic clubs to improve their communities by his parents, who were very active in the Jaycees while he was growing up. Lion Jerry states that participation with the Lions allows his family to "make a difference in the community. We see it every summer with our Lumberjack Breakfast, which has become a community event where people will wait in line for an hour talking to friends and meeting casual acquaintances. The money that is raised stays in our local community, buying eyeglasses, assisting the Lion's Eye Bank and other local community needs." Lion Jerry is joined by his father-in-law Lion Jack Haines and his son Lion Grant Boehme.

Lion Jack joined the East Albany Club in 1957. In his six decades of service, Lion Jack has served in so many roles and countless community improvement projects. He speaks with pride of his son-in-law's involvement with the Jaycees and saw that service as a launching pad for his current service as a Lion. He notes that the advent of females in the local club was a point of contention among some members initially, but that it has borne much fruit. "We have kind, talkative, hard-working men and women Lions." he stated.

His grandson Lion Grant is currently serving in the Air Force but has worked on Lions projects since he was very young. Lion Grant joined the East Albany Club in 2012. Whether ringing the Salvation Army bell alongside his dad, or grandpa, helping at the Gun Show, or serving at the Lumberjack Breakfast, Lion Grant speaks of many fond memories and the values he's gained through his participation with Lions. These values provide a strong foundation in his service to our country.

Lion Grant notes that Lions was his first chance as a youth to see how volunteering, community service and so many of his other traits were forged. "All along, both my father and grandfather were there to guide me, and more importantly, lead by example."

Lion Lou Amerson is the matriarch of the other three-generation family in the local Club. Lion Lou joined Lions shortly after moving to Baker City in 1994. "I was hooked by hands-on fundraising ... to better my community while also contributing to worldwide needs." she said. Since that time, she has "found a home in the Lions Clubs in Springfield, Junction City, and now in Albany." She's found participating in the local club as a way for her to get involved in her local community.

People join Lions for a variety of reasons. What makes them stay are stories, experiences and life connections that affirm their service and deepen their bonds to each other and to their communities. The example Lion Lou has set for her granddaughter Lion Jadie De Lille Wright and daughter Lion Jeannie Wright led to them joining her in the East Albany Club in 2015.

"I chose to join Lions after seeing my mom involved in worthy, community-oriented projects." Lion Jeannie said. Lion Jadie adds, "It's empowering! It's a great feeling where all three of us push each other and support each other within the club and in our lives."

Grandma Lion Lou echoes Lion Jadie's sentiments. "My heart bursts with pride when I see my granddaughter in leadership positions and my daughter taking on projects that sorely needed a leader." she gushed. Lion Jadie sees the value of having fun while working together to serve her community. "You can join too!" she stated. "Do you want to help out your community and those in need while having fun?
