Membership continues to decline which is still having an impact on declining revenues which in turn is affecting our cash flow. All of you have received statements through May 2017.



1. Thank you to all on our District O cabinet members who volunteered over the year. Whether these Lions volunteered a few hours or many hours, I so appreciate their work. I want to also thank my fellow district governors DG Debi, DG Bob and DG Tom, Council Chair Brad, and other Lion leaders who helped mentor and assist me (big THANKS to PID Sunny and CC Joyce). And, last but not least, thank you goes to Leah for excellent administrative work, which kept us governors organized.

2. District O Accomplishments:

- Club Visitations: I visited almost all of the 40 Lions clubs
- First Aid Kits: On my visits, club members made first aid kits for those in need. A total of 1,000 kits will be made before June 30th.
- Photos: I took photos of each club and included it in a monthly article about the clubs in the Multiple District Lion magazine.
- GAT: We held several Global Action Team (GAT) meetings over the year to select a future VDG, determine our course of action, and identify clubs to start or strengthen.
- District Convention: We held a fun one-day district convention on Saturday, February 24 at Portland Community College's Rock Creek Campus. About 170 people registered and about 160 attended.
- New Lions Club: We tried to start a new Lions club with the Portland Himalayan Club. Because the prospective club president lived in San Francisco, we could not get enough people to sign up as members. We still hold out that we might next year start a branch club with this Nepalese community.
- New Branch Club: This spring, District O leaders are trying to start a cyber branch club in King City and also another branch club in Summerfield, part of King City. Much of this work is being done by Zone Chair Dane Parreira and GST Fae Lloyd.
- Strengthening Clubs: I helped transition the Lake Grove Lions Club to a "company club" so that it would not close when most of its members decided to resign. District zone chairs and other leaders have worked hard to build up Lions clubs around the district. Thank you zone chairs!
- District Committees: One of my goals was to increase the number of people on district committees. To date we have 7 committees with more than one person.
- District 3-year Strategic Plan: Another of my goals is for key leaders to create a 3-Year Strategic Plan for the district for membership, leadership and service. These leaders will meet this spring to develop a draft of a plan.
- Increase Committee Time: At cabinet meetings, we had opportunities for committees to meet and discuss goals.
- Social Media: District 36-O Facebook and Instragram pages were updated weekly or more often with photos of Lions at work and announcements from club activities.
- Subcommittees: Leadership subcommittees met monthly to determine how we can better help clubs and how to start new clubs.
- 3. Multiple District Convention: We look forward to the big convention in Eugene at the Valley River Inn on Friday and Saturday, May 18-19. The Friday night District O Awards Banquet will be fun with a dress up theme. Please dress up in Western wear, sports clothing or a patriotic hat or shirt.
- 4. Thanks again! It's been my joy and pleasure to serve as your district governor this year. It's been a fun and productive year. I soon switch gears to be a zone chair and GMT next Lion year, help incoming DG Dan Wolf, and also mentor other Lion leaders.

District 36-R Report May 17, 2018

Club Visits

I will not be visiting all clubs in the district, but I am attempting to at least make contact with those who have not responded to my requests to visit.

Club Financial Status

We had four clubs in arrears with LCI since the last COG meeting, but as of this writing, it appears all four have been cleared up.

Club Reporting

District 36-R has serious work to do when it comes to reporting. The April Healthy Club Assessment report indicates:

- 1. 40% of 36-R clubs have not filed an MMR report in three months or more.
- 2. Almost 46% of our clubs have not reported activities year to date.

Membership

As of this writing, District 36-R stands at minus 18 for the 2017-18 Lions year. The Pacific Sea Lions and the Newport Lions are attempting to work out details needed for the two clubs to merge. It remains to be seen if this will happen. What started out as a fairly smooth merger process has since met with some stumbling blocks. If the merger can't be accomplished, the Pacific Sea club will close, and it will be up to the individual members to decide if they would like to transfer to Newport or some other club.

Leadership

Lion Linda Stent has stepped up to run for Second Vice District Governor in District 36-R. In accordance with LCI and MD36 policy for filling a vacancy, Linda's candidacy will be considered at the 36-R cabinet meeting on May 12.

Heartfelt Guest House LCIF Grant

Ground has been broken for the Heartfelt Guest House in Eugene, and regular progress reports to LCIF have begun to be submitted. Although the needed matching funds have been raised, we continue to accept donations in hopes of upping the total Lions contribution to the project to \$250,000.

Women's Symposium

The district's third annual Women's Symposium took place on April 28 at the Wheeler Pavilion in Eugene. Although we would always love to have more people in attendance, I feel the event was a success. This year's speakers this year were exceptionally good. It is my understanding that the committee has applied for a grant from LCI in preparation for next year's symposium, so this should to be an ongoing event.

The Board also affirmed values statements and corporate goals that will take LVG through the next 3-5 years of operations.

In April, local representatives from the Organ, Eye and Tissue banking communities went to the State Capital for the signing ceremony of a new bill to designate the second week of April as Organ, Eye and Tissue Donor Appreciation Week. The bill also creates a "Gift of Life Award". The champion of this bill is Jerod Doerner who is both a heart recipient and a Boy Scout who needed a service project to get his Eagle Scout badge. His story and the bill was welcomed with unanimous support across both aisles. Also present at the ceremony were donor family representatives and recipients of corneal and organ transplants. It was a great day for donation in Oregon which will aid the recognition of those who give so selflessly of themselves so that others may have renewed life through the gift of donation.



In 2010, Lions VisionGift began preparing eye drops from patient blood to help patients with conditions such as severe dry eye, cornea ulcers, and other ocular surface disorders. Patient blood is drawn at Lions VisionGift by a mobile phlebotomist and the eye bank mixes the serum from the blood (the clear part of the blood that does not contain red cells) with saline using sterile conditions. For some patients, these drops are a last resort that keeps them from living in severe pain. Since 2010, over 1000 patients have been helped with these drops (many return over and over) and last year was a record with over 525 patient blood draws. This year, one of our Board members needed the service and they said "I always knew that LVG was a great force for good, but to experience the help first hand was quite dramatic!"

Council of Governors Report 05/17/2018



The Eye Bank Association of America (EBAA) just put out its annual statistics report. It is an incredibly dense document that measures eye banking on hundreds of data points. For the first time ever, the report is broken down into three separate documents: a summary, a US eye banking report, and a Canadian eye banking report. A couple trends stand out. First, the number of eye banks reporting went down from 62 to 57. With fewer eye banks reporting due to consolidation, the number of corneas distributed for intermediate transplant went UP from 75,926 to 77,579. As we distributed 1757 corneas for transplant last year (a record number), we account for about 2.2% of the US-derived transplants. Last year, Descemet Membrane Endothelial Keratoplasty (DMEK) continued to gain popularity for endothelial replacement, but not at the meteoric rise of prior years. It now accounts for 7628 of the total EK performed in the United States last year (28,993). As LVG prepared 910 grafts for domestic DMEK use last year, we account for over 12% of all the DMEKs performed in the US.

In other EBAA news, Lions VisionGift continues to have a strong presence in the Association. The EBAA sets standards for eye banking, accredits to those standards, advocates on behalf of the eye banking community, and is THE place to share information about best practices and innovation. In the next two year cycle, four Lions VisionGift staff will chair EBAA committees. Other staff will participate on key committees. It's a testament to the incredible commitment Lions VisionGift has to share what we know with the community so that others may benefit from our very talented professionals.

Additionally, the eye bank just entered into a formal five year agreement with Pacific Northwest Transplant Bank (the organ bank for Oregon, SW Washington and western Idaho) as well as Community Tissue Services to be the referral center to handle donation communication from all hospitals in this geographic area. This new collaboration will require significant upgrades to telecommunications and database infrastructure, staffing, and training. The investment is anticipated by all parties to greatly improve communication and collaboration among the donation agencies in the Pacific Northwest which will ultimately benefit the community through more efficient and higher quality communications. That surely will translate into more people helped through the gift of organ, eye and tissue donation!

There is much much more that LVG is involved in that Lions should know about. Perhaps foremost is LVG's incredible research program has been more productive than ever. CEO Chris Stoeger will present at the MD36 Convention on Friday May 18 for anyone interested in hearing more about the advances taking place due to work at LVG.

 vision screening organizations in Oregon that are eligible for reimbursement from the
 new ODE school vision screening fund. This means that the Foundation now has an
 established revenue stream to support its school vision screening program and should
 be able to maintain screening at our current level, just over 180,000 students per year,
 the largest program of its kind in the nation.

 Center Fund. This fund will be managed by Ferguson Wellman Investments and will use
 a portion of these funds each year to support hearing assistance in Lane County. More

Co-chair Charlene Larsen attended a Lutheran Disaster Response gathering in Argyle, Texas in February and presented a disaster preparedness workshop in Seaside, OR. in March.

We continue to collaborate with the Oregon VOAD organization and had an Oregon Lions Alert Booth at the Mountain West VOAD Conference.

Our message to Oregon Lions in MD36 is to be prepared yourself for you and your family in the case of an emergency so you can then be our eyes and ears on the ground in your community during a disaster.

Become involved in American Red Cross training in your community, CERT (Citizen Emergency Response Team) and look at Lions Club International Foundation website to become familiar with the "Disaster Grant Programs" and the roll your District Governors play in securing Disaster Preparedness Grants, Emergency Grants, Community Recovery Grants, Long-term Construction/Equipment Standard Grants.

1. The purpose of Lions Quest focuses on Positive Youth Development. It is divided into three parts:

Skills for Growing---grades K-5 Skills for Adolescents---grades 6-8 Service Learning---grades 9-12

The program is revised every two years. The most current revision included a section on how to deal with bullying.

This program does not require the direct involvement of a local school district. Forest Grove Lions received a \$33,000 Core 4 grant to assist a private group helping students in Forest Grove and Hillsboro.

- 2. During the past two years, MD 36 has received over \$60,000 in grants from Lions Club International Foundation to support projects in Districts O, R and G. A \$10,000 Community Partnership Grant is available for District E. All Districts are eligible to apply for a Core 4 Grant. These grants are not tied to any other Core 4 grant so it makes it easier to apply. I will gladly meet with any club considering such an application.
- 3. I have made presentations to District E and G Conventions this year. We have interest from 6 school districts in District E and 3 in District G.
- 4. Several presentations have been made in District O. Currently, we have interest from two clubs and three school districts. In District O, Eugene, Springfield and Junction City School Districts have made contact with LCIF regarding the program.
