- c) CC Sharon then spoke about another item mentioned at the Pre-CoG/GAT meetings yesterday: A Strides Walk at the MD36 Convention in May of 2020 in Canyonville for pediatric cancer (one of LCI's focuses for service). A ½ mile walk, then water will be provided, and then a ½ mile walk back. There would be around a \$20 registration fee for this which would hopefully include a t-shirt. Proceeds would be donated to a pediatric cancer fund to be distributed to a site in District E. (We have traditionally had the funds collected be donated to a facility in the district where the Annual Convention is being held.) *Motion* made by DG Gary Mose to develop the idea of a Pediatric Strides Walk at the MD36 Convention in May of 2020. The *motion* was *seconded* by DG Terry Bowman. *Motion carried*.

Our state office continues to run smoothly handling monthly duties including our monthly magazine, monthly financial reports, answering the many inquiries that come from Lions and our communities. I remind each of you to notify the state office if you have any changes to the state directory. Leah continues to work on keeping our website up-to-date.

Remember your articles due dates in order to get them publish each month.

After each Council meeting Leah will send out an email to let you know that you can access the minutes on line to review and download. If you find any corrections please send to Leah and it will also need to be announced at the next council meeting.

State directories are sent to each club, each Governor including their cabinet, MD Officers and MD committee chairs. Extras are sold for \$5 per book. We have extras of the directories that anyone can buy.

Governors don't forget to turn in your monthly expense reports on a timely manner. This is very important as it will affect future Governor's budget that they are given for their year from Lions Clubs International for reimbursement of their monthly expense permitted by LCI's rules of audit. By not turning in your reports it will reduce next year's Governors expense reimbursement. If you have any questions or need help please don't hesitate to ask me.

Financial reports through June 30, 2019 are still being reviewed and updated for yearend adjustments. The yearend statement when completed will be sent to the finance committee for review. Council will see report by next council meeting. Our MD net membership ended for the year 2018-2019 at a minus 75 members, bring our total membership down to 3319 with 138 club as of June 30, 2019. In July 2019 we loss 18 more members and two clubs. Districts are having a challenge from collecting dues from a few clubs, which in turn are not paying total amount due to the MD 36. Right now this isn't affecting our cash flow materially but it could in the future if this trend continues. We have also had a few requests to write off dues owed to the MD by cabinet treasurers due to club billing errors or none payment of dues. I have done ten years of graphs of our membership by month to show what has been happening to our districts.


Our challenge continues to be meeting the wants of our council as a whole while learning to do with less funds.

I went over to help the West Salem Lions for their concert in the park night sponsored by Salem Electric and they gave out around 300 free hot dog coupons. I wrapped a lot of dogs (WOW). Everyone is to be reminded that any event that has a flyer can go out on constant contact and PDG Tom Hilgers can explain more.

Leadership- Our first cabinet meeting is set for next Saturday August 24th and we are planning an officer training. For More info on this see PCC Rob Bach GLT report and you will see our plan.

On Thursday August 15th we sent in an Emergency Preparedness Grant Request for MD 36R in conjunction with Central School District a District can request 1 once every 3 years. We need to do this every 3 yrs to get all our communities ready in the event of a disaster. We know that people will come to our schools if there is an event and that's why I started this with the school district. We will also be putting together some CERT training for our District Staff /Lions and Community.

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Council of Governors Report, August 17, 2019 District 36E District Governor Bob Chaney, Sr.

So far this young year has been very rewarding for me as I have visited the clubs within my district. As many of you know we have a rather geographically large district and traveling to a single club meeting can mean several hours on the road. The positive that I have taken from these many hours of driving is the fact that I have alone time to reflect on things, formulate new strategies and sing at the top of my lungs with no one telling me to be quiet.

It has given me opportunities to renew my Lions spirit and reinforce the ideas that the District 36E Governor's team came up with for this year. I know you don't really want to listen to me drone on philosophically. You would rather hear the numbers so here goes.

By The Numbers

Membership -- Membership within 36E so far is at a plus. As of August 13 we had a total of 742 members in 36 clubs. So far our goal of having a plus is holding and if each member just asks one person to consider membership in the Lions by the end of the year we could have a substantial plus.

As far as new club development we are still looking at the possibility of a club in northern California. Also Brookings-Harbor is in the process of establishing a branch club

Myrtle Creek is also attempting to establish a branch club. They are also starting a community-based Alpha Leos Club. This is a joint effort between Myrtle Creek, Canyonville and Riddle.

Leadership -- The district is offering training for all officers at any time it is needed. PCC Gail Black is also in the process of setting up four regional Guiding Lions training. Currently we have no Guiding Lions in the district with all of those certifications having expired in June. Both Gail and myself will get certified and then travel to the specific regions to provide the training.

In District E we have two certified graduates for the Faculty Development Institute, PCC Black and myself and either one or both of us are willing to travel to provide training anywhere it is need within MD 36.

We have eight Lions registered to attend the USA/Canada Leadership Forum in Spokane in September. Those attending are PDG Wes King, Carol King, Jane Thomas, GST Danny Hawkes, 1st VDG Carolee Blatter, 2nd VDG Steve Brewster, PCC Gail Black and myself.

1st VDG Carolee Blatter will be receiving her Bachelor's Degree from Lions University and I will be receiving my Doctorate.

We are also trying to schedule a one-day Leos Convention that is separate from the district convention

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Service -- We are currently working towards establishing four district-wide service projects, one per quarter.

Clubs still are not entering service hours on MyLion and we are working to make sure that we have everyone trained on how to do this so we can have 100 percent of our clubs reporting on a monthly basis.

Visitations -- I started my official visit's the first of August and as of this last Wednesday I have had the pleasure of meeting with one-fourth of the clubs in District E and have had wonderful visits.

It is always so interesting to see and hear the different ways that each club serves their community. Also positive is to hear of the collaborations between clubs and other entities in their area as well as cooperation between clubs in a specific area.

My schedule of visits for September is also very full along with USA/'Canada Forum woven in and if everything goes according to plan by the first of October I will have completed half of my visitations with plans to have them all completed by Thanksgiving.

The reason for an aggressive schedule is that it will allow me to make return visits to clubs where I feel more attention is need and also will allow for me to return to certain areas to take part in club fundraisers and service projects.

District 36E Together has begun to Restore the Roar and as the Beacons of Lionism we will Continue to Rock the Roar this year and for years to come.

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Council of Governors Meeting District 36G Report August 17th, 2019

Well my term has started and the month of August is full of club visitations and my first Cabinet Meeting. Sue and I decided why should we miss our camping trips so we are staying at club lodges and RV parks and seeing a lot of beautiful sites. Jordan Valley was our first stop where we stayed at the Lions Club House. It was a wonderful visit and I swore in 4 new members, it would have been seven but three were unable to be there.

Next was my first cabinet meeting which was held in La Grande at the Flying J Restaurant. I would like to thank the 20 that were able to attend. I understand it's a ways to drive for some, this is why I've scheduled the Cabinet meetings in different locations. We also adjusted the Cabinet meeting times to allow for an hour of Officer training. 2019-2010 budgets were passed with a new budgeting format and standard LCI accounting practices. I shared my goals, my theme and DG service project for Pediatric Cancer. We will begin a District focus on growing and expanding our Youth Exchange Program. I'm asking each club to create a Youth Exchange Representative to assist our District Youth Exchange Chair, PDG Paul Zastrow, in reinstituting the program across the District. We've turned prospective youth away from Oregon for way too long. It will take time, but I believe with additional resources and training, the Youth Exchange Program will become viable again in District 36G.

I would like to thank GLT Richard Smith for setting up Officer training after the Cabinet meetings. Lion Richard conducted the President's Training and Sue Mose conducted the Secretary/Treasurer's training. I was able to give our 1st VDG, John Taylor, one on one training. 1st VDG will be accompanying me on some club visits. Lion Richard has officer training scheduled after the

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October and May cabinet meetings. We will be scheduling Zone Chair training in the near future.

My August club visitations continue with Elgin, Enterprise, La Grande, Weston Mc Gwen, Island City, Pendleton and Baker City. I'm finalizing visits for September and October.

My team is working on starting both a Lions club and a Leo's club in Dufur. We made our first visit in July. We will continue developing a plan to start new clubs in John Day and Milton–Freewater, in addition to building the Redmond Sunshine Club.

- 5. Once a chapter has been reviewed, and changed, copies of changes will be forwarded in a timely manner to all voting members of the council for their review prior to the CoG meeting. If changes are to be presented to the CoG, PMC will ask for an agenda item for presentation at the next council meeting.

Oregon Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation Council of Governor's Report - Yachats Lions Clubhouse - Yachats, OR – August 17th, 2019

- OLSHF had a record-breaking year of service in 2018-19, partnering with MD-36 Lions to provide services to over 235,000 people in need in Oregon and Northern California, including over 46,000 pair of used eyeglasses dispensed through the Lions Eyeglass Recycling Program (LERC) in developing countries. Our 2018-19 Impact Report – included in your report – reflects the following:
 - o 176,005 students screened at 583 School Vision Screening events
 - o 1,967 adults screened at 60 Community Health screening events
 - o 187,200 pairs of used eyeglasses collected by MD36 Lions
 - o 46,156 pairs of used eyeglasses distributed to people in need in developing countries
 - o 2,342 eyeglasses made and distributed through the OLSHF LEAP Lab
 - 232 people receiving new or refurbished hearing aids through the OLSHF ROAR!
 program
 - o 856 children receiving eye exams and new eyeglasses through the KEX Kids Fund
 - 134 people in need receiving surgery and treatment through Patient Care and Mission Cataract programs
 - 133 children with special needs receiving low vision exams from Dr. JP Lowery of Pacific University and the Lions Low Vision program
- OLSHF's 2020 School Vision Screening Program is gearing up for the 2019-20 school year. We
 have already scheduled over 500 school screening events and likely will exceed the number of
 students screened last school year. Due to the successful advocacy effort at the Oregon
 Legislature in 2019, schools in Oregon will have twice as much state funding for vision screening
 during this 2019-2021 biennium. We anticipate that because of the new funding, well over
 200,000 students should now be able to be screened for vision health issues.
- In order to fully utilize the new state funding available for vision screening in Oregon schools, the Foundation will need to acquire additional SPOT vision photo screeners to increase our current capacity. We are considering kicking off a Capital Campaign this fall to raise the funds necessary to not only purchase 20 new SPOT devices but also to expand the square footage of the LEAP Optical lab and to create an internship for graduates of the paraoptometric program at the Coffee Creek Correctional Facility for Women. We'll have more information on our new 2020 Vision Capital Campaign at the November Council of Governor's meeting.
- OLSHF is currently assessing our ability to enhance our existing school-based hearing screening
 program. We are looking at new hearing screening technology that could enable OLSHF to
 screen significantly more Oregon students for mild to severe hearing loss, and doing so in a
 highly accurate manner. Our Program Services Committee is working with OLSHF Staff to learn
 more about this opportunity and will make a recommendation to the OLSHF Board in the next
 few months.
- We continue to celebrate our 60th Anniversary here in 2019 and cordially invite the Council of Governor's to our Nifty 50's Gala on November 2nd at the Elysian Ballroom. To honor our founding in 1959, COG's in attendance are strongly encouraged to dress as Elvis, though not required to do so.
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MD36 Oregon Lions Alert Report

August 17, 2019 Report to Council of Governors, Yachats, Oregon

Preparedness, Training, and Collaboration are keys to what is happening with the MD 36 Oregon Lions Alert Team.

The La Pine Lions Club showed off their new disaster relief vehicle during a wildfire in May. District 36 G's new Alert Committee Chair, Michelle Hazeltine led this effort. They are ready in La Pine!

The District 36 O outgoing District Governor Dan Wolf and Alert Chair Charlene Larsen helped with the submission of a Lions Club International Foundation Disaster Readiness Grant with Parents for Preparedness at Robert Gray Middle School in the Montevilla District of Portland. Mollyanne Fleming of P4P was the driver and the grant has been awarded by LCIF and received by District 36 O Treasurer. There will be a completion date to share, soon, and a celebration of the P4P project.

Then District 36 R District Governor Steve Moser is working with Central School District in the Independence/Monmouth area for a similar preparedness grant. The grant was submitted last week to LCIF and we will see what happens. Alert Team member Linda Stent will follow the progress of this grant for District 36 R.

Patti Longland Alert Team Chair for District E is aware of the hazards that can affect her district in Southern Oregon and the events that could impact the coastal communities. She is taking these lessons of the past from wildfires and training Lions to be prepared and ready to serve in a disaster.

Each District can apply for one of these preparedness grants every three years.

In District 36 O the Astoria Lions Club has a new self-contained, trailered BBQ unit with all the bells and whistles, they will be able to serve a large crowd in the event of a disaster.

As a collaborator, MD 36 Alert Team Chair, Charlene Larsen is at the table with her county emergency manager and working on a hazard mitigation team for Clatsop County. She also sits at the table with the ORVOAD membership and with Lutheran Disaster Response in Oregon and on the nation-wide team.

So, my question to all MD 36 Lions Clubs: "What do you have to support disaster preparedness?" What do your resources in your communities provide to help others in distress? A clubhouse, a food service unit, trained volunteers, ham radio operators, CERT trained volunteers. Let your Alert Team know.

The Oregon Lions Alert Team has a seat at the table of ORVOAD (Oregon Volunteers Active in Disasters). That means we also are plugged into Oregon Emergency Management.

Your team members are active in their communities and in professional and other service organizations, so we are connected and collaborating.

Oregon Lions Serve and we serve the most vulnerable.

CAMP TALOALI:

Camp Taloali (Pronounced Tuh-low-a-lee) is a 501-(c)(3) Camp for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing. It is located at Mile Post 16.431 (+/-) on Highway 22 just east of Stayton, Oregon with Camp driveway GPS Coordinates of 44.798017 N, 122.734592 W. It was started by The Teets Family and others in 1971 and was helped financially under the guidance of Past Council Chairman Walt Trandum, 1973-74. MD-36 Lions, Lions Clubs and other organizations have a long and storied history with Camp Taloali. We, as Lions, were instrumental in building the camp by organizing and providing crews and materials for constructing buildings and through years of supporting Camp projects. The building projects were joint efforts with Lions and the Deaf Community working together. Lions Clubs have built cabins, done maintenance, clean-up projects and serving when specific needs became apparent. In 2013 Lions and other donors enabled Camp Taloali to continue operating by raising funds for extremely important Camp repairs that were conducted by the Crooked River Ranch Lions Club.

The Camp Taloali fiscal year spans from March 1 to and through the last day of February. The volunteer Board Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary, Treasurer, Executive Council and the Board of Directors serve for that year and are able to continue if they so choose. The term "volunteer" is very accurate in that Board Members receive no payment and also donate funds, help with fund raising and do anything that they can to serve. Unfortunately the Camp Taloali Lions Club no longer exists. We are now designing a new gender-neutral restroom/shower building and cabin extensions to serve more people in accordance with The American Camping Association guidelines.

There were two (2) Camp sessions in 2019 that were open to youth 6 to 15 years of age (and their siblings) with sessions from June 30 to July 6 and from July 7 to July 13. A overnight campership includes room and board and is \$500.00 per session. For campers that stay for two (2) sessions, a weekend stay between sessions is \$75.00. Local youth may attend as a "day camp" for \$250 per session. This year at Session 1 there were 20 overnight and 4 day campers and at session 2 there were 27 overnight and 9 day campers. The total is 47 overnight and 13 day campers. The Councilors in Training sessions for people 16 and 17 years old is conducted before and during the camp sessions. These students hopefully will serve as future camp Councilors.

Camp Taloali also rents the Camp to other groups and individuals to fulfill their needs in a quiet and somewhat secluded setting:

1) The 50th year of the Youth Leadership Camp (YLC) was held from July 11 through August 11 this year. The YLC is for youth in the deaf and hard of hearing community and is a program of the National Association of the Deaf. The cost is \$2650 and scholarships are somewhat available. The YLC is a training session to train youth how to lead and to become leaders in their community. In a session on 8/11/19 we asked Mr. Frank L. Turk and others: What is the best method of informing Lions Clubs that the Dear Community, by necessity, only speaks a different language and that their community is just like everyone else? RESPONSE: Have a member of the Deaf Community with you when you speak to Lions Clubs.

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- 2) Each year on Labor Day weekend, the World Deaf Timberfest is held at Camp Taloali. 2019 will b annual event. If you are able to attend, you will be silent unless you spear American Sign Language (ASL). The event rents the Camp Site and donates funds for the upkeep of the Camp. Ed Sullivan might have said "this is a really big event" and is well attended from throughout the world.
- 3) September 27 and 28, 2019 will be a two night Haunted Forest from 8:00 PM to 11:00 PM. The Haunted Forest features actors from the Oregon Deaf Community stationed on a trail through the forest. This if for all people who want to have pre-Halloween fun. The cost has been \$10.00 per person and is a significant fundraiser for camp projects.
- 4) Camp Taloali can be rented for your own events. Please see the Camp Talloali web-site.

THE GALES CREEK CAMP:

The Gales Creek Camp is a 501(c)(3) camp for training youth and families about and how to live with Type I Diabetes. Gales Creek Camp is accredited by The American Camp Association which means strict adherence to the Association guidelines and requirements. "This is the place where type 1 isn't the only 1". The goal of The Gales Creek Camp is to teach self-care habits that will help youth grow into healthy adults by learning testing, how to give injections, how food and exercise are related and how sports, illnesses and stress interact with diabetes. The bottom line is their own body management.

Staff members, many of whom have type 1 diabetes, serve as examples and models of healthy habits and demonstrate that children with diabetes are not limited by the diagnosis.

The Gales Creek Camp is at 59424 NW Cedarbrook Lane, Gales Creek, Oregon 97117. (45.651201 N. 123.280251 W.) on Highway 6 between Banks and Tillamook. The Camp Sessions are set up for youth in age groups. For students entering the sophomore, junior and senior years of high school, the \$475 camps were from June 23-28 and from June 30 to July 5. For students entering the 8th grade or freshman year in high school, the camp dates were from July 7-12 and July 14-19. For students coming into grades 6 and 7, the camp dates were July 21-26 and from July 28 to August 2. For students coming into grades 3, 4 and 5, the camp dates were August 4-8 (A four night session) and August 11-16 (A five night session). This year 501 students have attended Gales Creek Camp. The cost of a camp session is \$475 (\$380 for the four night session). This is a very low cost for a camp and the approximately \$1000 actual cost is covered through donations and fund raising.

A Family Camp will be held on August 10, 2019. This Camp fee will be \$50 for a family of two, \$75 for a family of 3 and \$100 for a family of four.

A Family Camp will be held on September 7-8, 2019. This Camp fee will be \$100 for a family of two, \$200 for a family of 3 and \$300 for a family of four.

We know of three fundraisers:

- 1) September 9, 2019. At The Reserve and Vineyard Gold Course. Both the north and south courses will be used. The entry fee is \$120.00. Contact The Gales Creek Foundation at (503)-968-2267. The course is at 4805 SW 229th Avenue in Aloha, Oregon 97007.
- 2) August 24-25, 2019. This is a \$150.00 fundraiser at Gales Creek Camp, Saturday and Sunday. There will be speakers on the 24th and meals and a snack are provided on that date along with a snack. This is a diabetes learning session.
- 3) In 2020 there will be a Spring Break Golf Tournament (+/-) at Top Golf. This is a joint fundraiser with other organizations, one of which is the Shriners. Top Golf is at 5505 NE Huffman Street, Hillsboro, Oregon 97124. The entry fee is \$1200 for a team of 6 to 8 players. Top Golf is a computerized network system where accuracy of aiming at targets is measured for fun and for competition. The special golf balls used are computer traced for the scoring system.

Each June a Camp cleanup if held from 9:00 AM to Noon with an Open House and lunch following. This is a great project for Lions Clubs.

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Donations are always accepted. Each year a list of "needed" items is posted. Gift Certificates from Whole Foods and New Seasons are extremely useful for specialty food items needed for the Camp.

The Arts instructor at Gales Creek Camp is a professional artist. She does not dabble in "makeshift" are but instructs students in "real" art. Gift certificates at "BLICK" are extremely useful for real art supplies for the many art sessions held at Gales Creek Camp throughout the summer sessions.

THE ORAL HULL CAMP for the BLIND and LOW VISION:

The Camp and Foundation are at 43233 SE Oral Hull Road, Sandy, Oregon 97055 GPS Coordinates: 45.399237 N., 122.218065 W.

Typically over 300 adults with blindness and low vision are served throughout the year.

The Oral Hull Park and facilities are provided for children with blindness each summer through the Columbia Regional ESD program.

The Oral Hull Foundation mission as a non-profit is to provide educational, social and recreational classes, events, resources and services to anyone with any type of vision loss.

Most of the camp constituents are from Oregon and Washington but the summer recreation retreats have people from all over the United States.

"Living with Vision Loss" is a new program for seniors who have been diagnosed with age related vision loss diseases. This program helps maintain independence. The seminars and specific topic classes are usually at the Oral Hull facilities but can be set up anywhere in the Portland Metro area, depending on space availability.

No one is turned away for lack of funding but participants are asked to pay for:

- 1) Living with Vision Loss Seminars: \$150-\$200 (actual cost is \$375 per person)
- 2) Living With Vision Loss Workshops and Classes; \$75-\$100 (actual cost \$150-\$250 per person)
- 3) Friends with Alumni Retreat: \$450 (actual cost \$650 per person)
- 4) Winter, Social, Moderate and High Adventure Retreats \$650-\$750 (actual cost is \$850-\$1050 per person)

One to two hour presentations are provided for retirement and senior communities and centers throughout the year at NO CHARGE.

For a nominal fee, The Park property is offered (when not in use with Oral Hull Events) for weddings, reunions, special events, group specific workshops. The funds gathered therefrom are used to maintain the Park Buildings. The rental prices vary depending upon the renters needs.

The buildings and facilities include: a 24 room dormitory, grand lodge, an indoor heated swimming pool (not the Sandy River), 12-person hot tub, covered picnic shelter, workshop and classroom building, a stocked trout pond and 22 acres of forested meadows and hiking trails. The Garden of Enhancement is a ½ acre paved path area that is totally maintained by the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs. This area was begun in 1971.

CAMP MEADOWOOD SPRINGS:

The Camp is at 77650 Meadowood Road in Weston, Oregon 97886. The Camp GPS Coordinates are: 45.782389 N, 118.230421 W. The camp was formed in 1964 as Meadowood Springs Speech and Hearing Camp on land donated by the Hendricks Family of Milton-Freewater. In 2004 it was the only certified speech and hearing camp in the United States. The scope of the camp was broadened to include those with other communication problems and social challenges and therefore, in 2010, the name was changed to Camp Meadowood Springs.

The Lions involvement in the camp is to let people and educators know that Camp Meadowood Springs exists and how qualified students can be helped there. Even though the Camp is in foothills of the Blue Mountains and is close to the Wallowa-Whitman National Forest, the Camp provides a safe site and environment for students ages 6 to 14.

Qualifications for Camp attendance are quite broad for the \$1350 weekly and \$500 non-stay sessions:

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1) A diagnosis that affects speech and/or social learning (ASD, ADD/ADHD, Asperger's, Down Syndrome, Etc.).

- 2) Receive speech therapy or social skills training from a private clinician or within public school,
- 3) Do not qualify for educational services but could benefit from them,
- 4) Are neurotypical (non-impacted) but have siblings and/or peers that are qualified campers.

Attending students quite often exhibit significant improvements after a week session.

MD36 Diabetes Report August 17, 2019

Fellow Lions of MD36, it's hard for me to believe that I've been chosen to fill the same position that my late Father In-law (PDG 36G, Rogers Wheatley) as your Multiple District Diabetes Awareness Chair. I promise to use every bit of knowledge and research to the best of my ability to get the information that is needed to inform you about this Silent Epidemic, DIABETES, that you can take it to inform the people in your communities.

I would also like to thank PCC Charlie Tate for his many years as Chair of the Multiple District 36 Diabetes Awareness. I enjoyed the many talks we had about diabetes and lions and the friendship that developed. I know that I can call you any time for help and advice and of course talks just for the heck of it.

I mentioned that my father in-law held this position. He was a type 2 diabetic, and my late wife (Sherrie) was type 2, but the two of them approached the control of the disease differently. My wife worked hard to keep her diabetes under control, with diet, exercise and as little medication as possible. Her father was completely the opposite. Rogers was on insulin injection after he had heart by passes. He continued to eat whatever he felt like eating and relied on the injections of insulin to control his diabetes. The end result, he had all of his toes amputated. I loved my father in-law like he was my own father. He was my mentor on being a lion, and he was a great Diabetes Awareness presenter. BUT he did not walk what he talked.

I call Diabetes the Silent Epidemic because it is silent. You don't know if you have it until the signs are present and you go to see a doctor and have your HA1C checked. The signs for diabetes are pretty much a good indication that should not be ignored, especially if there's a history of diabetes in your family. Because of the history of my late wife and her father, our oldest child (our daughter) is also a type 2 diabetic, which also means that all of my kids and grandchildren have the potential to have type 2 diabetes.

Mankind has known about diabetes as far back as 1500 BC, but did not know how or what was causing the disease. Frequent urination was a sign that

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something was wrong besides the sweet smell and taste. Then in 1425 AD the Greeks first use of the word diabetes was recorded meaning "a siphon" or passed water like a siphon. Then in 1675, the Greek word mellitus, "like honey" to reflect the sweet smell and taste of the urine. It wasn't until July 1921 that one of the most important discovery in the history of medicine. Dr. Frederick Banting and medical student Charles H. Best discovered the hormone insulin. Jump ahead 42 years and we have the first insulin pump introduced, which was the size of a backpack, but it wasn't until the 1970s and later that great strides have been made in the treatment of diabetes. Research into diabetes has made great strides in helping those with diabetes to live fuller, longer and better lives than those in the far and near past.

We as Lions need to educate the public in our communities about the importance of not ignoring signs that could indicate the onset of the disease. Early detection is vital in the fight against all diabetes. Those who know they have diabetes have some awareness of the disease and just what to know if anything new has develop to help them to control or cure the disease.

It's the thousands of people who diabetic doctors don't consider, the people who are borderline or prediabetes as having diabetes. We as Lions have to be the ones to consider the borderline and prediabetes public. These are the ones that are going to be the hardest to make aware of the disease. How do we let them know that they must be on the lookout for the signs indicating they might have diabetes? My job as your Diabetes Awareness Chair is to make sure that you are all familiar with the disease and its signs, so that we as a group can go out into our communities and educate them on the importance of keeping watch for indicating signs of the disease.

MD36 Mexico Vision and Health Clinic Report Chair – PDG Sharon Elder

Our next clinic will be 11.06.19 in San Blas, Nayarit, a fishing village on the west coast of Mexico. We will fly into Puerto Vallarta and bus to San Blas, about a 4-5 hour drive, depending on traffic on the two lane road. We are being sponsored by a local, multi-village cooperative called A Dar Raza A.C. We have 51 volunteers signed up representing the following Lions clubs: District O-Portland Oaks Bottom, Legacy, Amity, Rockaway Beach, Estacada. District R: Roseburg and Dallas Clubs. Montana, Butte Lions Club and Canada Lions are from Edmonton, Lethbridge, Medicine Hat, Sherwood Park, and Prince Albert.

Oregon total volunteers: 26 Montana total volunteers: 1 Colorado total volunteers: 7 Washington total volunteers: 1 Canada total volunteers: 16

This group represents 2-optometrists, an optician, 2-orientation and mobility specialists and 2-nurses as well as energetic and enthusiastic volunteers from all walks of life. We will give vision care to 350-450 patients a day for 5-clinic days. Patients will come from outlying villages as well as from the indigenous people.

The Huichol or Wixaritari are an indigenous people of Mexico living in the Sierra Madre Occidental range in the states of Nayarit, Jalisco, Zacatecas and Durango.

Huichol are artisans creating beautiful sculptures and artwork from beads and string.






In addition to vision care we test for blood sugar and blood pressure levels.

At the conclusion of the clinic we will visit 2-local preschools in San Blas that we have been helping for the past 12 years with gifts of school supplies as well as meeting other building needs as they come up.

All volunteers pay their own airfare and hotel costs.



All volunteers pay their own airfare and hotel costs. Our hosts in Mexico serve breakfast and lunch (free) during clinic days as well as hosting a big fiesta on the last day of the clinic. Approximate cost for airfare and hotel, plus other meals are about approximately \$1200 per person. Other costs include clinic supplies, freight for the eyeglasses (we usually average 7-8,000 eyeglasses). If clubs would like to help either with a cash donation, supplies or small gifts (given to the patients at the end of their exams). Funds can

be sent to the Oral Hull Foundation for the Blind, PO Box 157, Sandy, OR 97055. Make sure you note in the memo space on the check "Lions Mexico Clinic". The Hull Foundation is our "treasurer" handling all the funds for the trip.

Clubs or individuals can also contribute by donating small gifts for the patients:

For men: baseball caps, hand razors, combs, key chains For women: costume jewelry, embroidery thread/needles, sewing kits, hair accessories

For children: hot wheel cars, small stuffed animals, any other type of small toys

In general: Toothbrushes, toothpaste (small tubes), pens, small note pads to write on, hotel size

shampoo, hotel size soap, combs, brushes, good condition soft eyeglass cases

If you would also like to donate school supplies (24 count crayons, pencils, glue sticks, preschool lined paper pads, construction paper, kid scissors) these can be sent to the same address noted above.

PDG Jim Jaggers, Lions Quest MD36 Chair

- Years ago, Oregon had a famous retailer who would knock on a TV window screen and yell "Wake Up" "Wake Up."
- 2. It is time for Oregon Lions to WAKE UP. Oregon has some major problems within its schools. That is one reason the State Legislature dropped a bundle of dollars into the school fund.
- 3. <u>Problem #1</u> -- The student suicide rate in Oregon is up alarmingly. One of Oregon's Lions Districts could have the highest Suicide rate across the nation by the end of the school year.
- 4. <u>Problem #2</u> -- Classrooms are becoming unsafe. No one seems to care. Several television stations around the State reported on this with a special entitled "Classroom in Crisis."
- 5. Lions have a program already set to address both of these Issues. It is time to take things seriously and WAKE UP.
- 6. Lions Quest can be a fully funded program that addresses student well-being, yet only a handful of clubs in three districts have become involved.
- 7. The major problem Lions have is a woeful training program. Many Lions think the club has to pay for all the training. Our leadershhip needs to make sure that Lions of Oregon are aware that the Multiple District is eligible for a \$150,000 grant for training. There are funds available from Lions Clubs International Foundation. These grants cover the costs for clubs. Several state of Oregon endowments provide funds as well.
- 8. If you have questions, check with St. Helens, Forest Grove, Salem and Hood River to name a few clubs who have made use of Lions Quest over the past few years. It's FREE and a great Public Relations tool for your clubs.



We certainly are not doing everything right, AND we certainly aren't doing

Maybe we want to start with just two...and develop a plan to stop a couple of habits that are nonproductive. So, take a look at Marshall's "20 Things" and just sit a bit and contemplate what you might want to work on stopping. And, then, work on them—take action—be better!

20 Things Leaders Need to Stop Doing

1. Winning too much: The need to win at all costs and in all situations-when it matters, when it doesn't, and when it's totally beside the point.

- 2. Adding too much value: The overwhelming desire to add our two cents to every discussion.
- 3. Passing judgment: The need to rate others and impose our standards on them.

- 13. Clinging to the past: The need to deflect blame away from ourselves and onto events and people from our past; a subset of blaming everyone else.
- 14. Playing favorites: Failing to see that we are treating someone unfairly.
- 15. Refusing to express regret: The inability to take responsibility for our actions, admit we're wrong, or recognize how our actions affect others.
- 16. Not listening: The most passive-aggressive form of disrespect for colleagues.
- 17. Failing to express gratitude: The most basic form of bad manners.
- 18. Punishing the messenger: The misguided need to attack the innocent who are usually only trying to help
- 19. Passing the buck: The need to blame everyone but ourselves.
- 20. An excessive need to be "me": Exalting our faults as virtues simply because they're who we are.



Also a big thanks to CC Sharon and this year's Governors for their input and encouragement. And a big thanks to Linda Thomson graphics coordinator and PCC Steve Thomson for coordinating this grant, finding the best deals on our materials and generally helping the grant go above and beyond the original grant idea.

The basics of the grant is to develop a Club Public Relations Kit for the clubs to have materials they can share in their communities to 1. show off Lions and what we do, 2. Have materials such as flyers, stickers, and giveaways to inform the public about Lions.

Also Special Governors PR Kits were developed for each Governor which included specific materials for their Governors year. Lions magnetic door signs, License plate holders, stickers and other materials.

Originally materials were going to be mailed to each club president. However this year's Governors want to distribute the Club PR kits to the clubs during their club visits.

Each Governor has enough PR Kits for all of their clubs. The following is a list of what has been developed for the Public Relations Kits and materials for the Governors to hand out.

Several LCI and LCIF information flyers and information have been included in each kit. The PR Grant has paid for one year of Constant Contact which MD36 GST leader Tom Hilgers operates.

Our Grant is for \$8800. \$800 in matching funds came from last year's Governors. LCIF has sent half the grant funds last February. We have spent \$ 8468.53 (one invoice still needs to be paid). We will be sending the final report to LCIF in 2 weeks. After review LCIF ahould send us the remaining \$3668.53 Of the grant money awarded there will be \$331.47 unspent.
