Remember your articles due dates in order to get them publish each month.

After each Council meeting Leah will send out an email to let you know that you can access the minutes on line to review and download. If you find any corrections please send to Leah and it will also need to be announced at the next council meeting.

State directories are sent to each club, each Governor including their cabinet, MD Officers and MD committee chairs. Extras are sold for \$5 per book. We have extras of the directories that anyone can buy.

Governors don't forget to turn in your monthly expense reports on a timely manner. This is very important as it will affect future Governor's budget that they are given for their year from Lions Clubs International for reimbursement of their monthly expense permitted by LCI's rules of audit. By not turning in your reports it will reduce next year's Governors expense reimbursement. If you have any questions or need help please don't hesitate to ask me.

Financial reports through March 31, 2019 have been email to the council but not reviewed by the finance committee. Our MD net membership is 1 up from the beginning of the year. Two of our district have a net increase. Dues income is down compared with budget. As a reminder budget showed membership with a small decline and actual shows a met gain of one. Districts are having a challenge from collecting dues from a few clubs, which in turn are not paying total amount due to the MD 36. Right now this isn't affecting our cash flow materially but it could in the future if this trend continues. We have also had a few requests to write off dues owed to the MD by cabinet treasurers due to club billing errors or none payment of dues. I have done ten years of graphs of our membership by month to show what has been happening to our districts.

Please make sure that your clubs are filing their PU101's on line. This information is used in our next year directory.


Our challenge continues to be meeting the wants of our council as a whole while learning to do with less funds.

If every Lion donates something, even if it's only \$5.00, with close to 1.5 million Lions worldwide think of the impact we will have. Some District O Clubs have already reach 100 % of their members donating something to LCIF. The mighty Tualatin Lions Club was the first to reach this level. I Congratulate the Tualatin Lions Club.

I am asking all of our Clubs to be thinking and planning some service activities to start the summer off with service to our communities, and to not forget to slip in a social event for our Clubs too, as we still want to have fun doing service.

Thank you to the Lions who attended the North West Lions Leadership Institute last month. It is great leadership training not only for us in Lions, but it has also helped many with their leadership skills at work, and in their businesses.

Council of Governors Meeting District 36-E Governor Report May 2, 2019

Yearly recap:

Mid-July 2018 -- fresh from International Convention in Las Vegas, slightly rested but excited to start a fairly healthy Visitation schedule: 6 clubs for the last of July, starting on the Southeast side of the district in the Klamath Falls area and a few coast towns.

I met great new Lions, as I was eager to inform them about new information received from Vegas. Clubs were eager to tell me about their signature service and community projects. I found out Crab Feeds in the Southeast are huge money makers and on the coast, crab feeds not so much. August brought me back to the Southeast again. Smokey this time to Lakeview and my 1st Cabinet meeting. Back in Klamath Falls, the Cabinet Meeting was well attended and a few more coast towns were visited. One of Powers Service Projects, "The Tour De France" bicycle race was in the works.

North Bend Lions informed me they had doubled their club membership from 4 to 8 – super news, as I had concerns about keeping them active this year. They seemed to be redirected and ready to go.

September and October fall time and work slows a little, time to really put in the visits: 16 clubs attended and Sutherlin Lions installed the new Alfa Leos Club Sept. 18th.

The grand opening of the expanded Dogs for Better Lives facility October 12th was impressive and the staff was very thankful for the Lions contributions.

Also on October 12, Roseburg Lions celebrated 90 Years. I was not home much – just me, the big white ford, a lot of fuel, and cheap motel rooms.

November through January, visits slowed. Well over half way, I was feeling good about seeing every club before the District E Convention in March, but Mother Nature and a few personal setbacks helped in the rescheduling department for club visits. My new goal is to finish visitations by May.

Sadly, our club lost three key Lions suddenly, one being our club President, turning my club upside down with Convention nearing.

Lions time stayed busy planning the Convention. The convention committee, host club, and partnering local clubs worked very hard to put on a super convention with ID Connie Lecleir-Meyer and husband Michael. The joint effort was successful.

During the February and April convention season, Patti and I had the pleasure of attending all of the conventions, and all were excellent and fun to attend.

In May, The MD convention, then followed up with the last 4 visits to complete my visitations.

June brings a new construction job at work and I will follow up with calls to dropped members and send letters to all new members, welcoming them to Lions District 36-E.

During my time on the road I have met wonderful Lions from every club. They are justifiably proud of the service and community projects they do.

We need to improve club reporting in several areas, encourage more clubs to attend conventions and take advantage of leadership opportunities Lions clubs offer, including leadership advancement at both club and district level.

I'm proud of the Sutherlin Lions for forming a new Alfa Leo's club. It's off to a bumpy start, but with Sutherlin Lions' help, they will go into their second year successfully.

Some extraordinary projects this year included District 36-E support of the Heartfelt House project and donating to the victims of the California "Camp Fire."

We hope to start a few new clubs soon: Dogs for Better Lives (a branch club in the Central Point area), Gasquet, Ca on Hwy 199, and Merlin are all in the works.

Current Membership in District-E is minus 11. Ending the year on the plus side is a achievable goal.

All in all, this last year has been rewarding and challenging at times, but a good experience I would not change. Dilly Dilly

Council or Governors Phyllis Carlin District Governor Report 36-6

<u>Leadership</u> - Two New Century Leadership Training sessions were organized by GLT Bev Bridgewater in the fall. One more will possibly be conducted in the eastern part of the district in early summer. Realizing that change is important and inevitable, the training focused on what we as Lions need to do to remain current and relevant. In addition, officier training was incldued in the session.

One of my main and most abitious goals was that at the end of the year 50% of the clubs in District G would be conducting New Member Orientation programs. Realizing early on in my club that a strong orientation program could help new members feel welcome and a part of the organization and also help with retention, I encouraged clubs to adopt an orientation program. The New Century Leadership Training gave me the opportunity to present a mock New Member Orientation early in the year. A considerable number of district clubs are instituting the own version of "orientation".

Membership - Membership growth was promoted through a six-week contest called "Membership Madness". The winner was the club with the largest % of growth determined by starting and ending membership numbers. About half the clubs had gains during this time period. The winning club had a 67% increase in membership. I couldn't have been more thrilled as this gain signalled a complete trun-around for this club. Two months before the end of the year, District G has a 15 member gain.

<u>Service</u> - District-wide we collected tabs for the Ronald McDonald House in Bend. Forty-eight pounds of tabs were presented to Lauren Ohlander at the District G Convention.

State-wide we supported the state initiative, collecting purses and tolitries which were given to Purses with a Purpose for distribution to different agencies in Central Oregon.

International President Gudrun Yngvadottir that all clubs institute a new service program this year. District G clubs have answered the call with new projects ranging from road clean-ups to city park upgrades.

My observations - I leave my year as District Governor fully convinced the Lions are an intrigral part of the fabric of their communities. While it is clear that we must change and evolve in order to remain current and relavent, it is also clear that our long-standing projects and traditions are an important part of community life. Take for example a crab feed, Hog Wild Days and a catfish derby that have been held in communities for thirty and forty plus years.

I leave humbled and awed at the impact Lions have on their communities. "Together We Can." Together we can do more, serve more, help more.

At our meeting we will be discussing where the PDGA is, what we should be doing to assist the incoming District Governors, electing our own officers and in general once again ensuring that all members are paid up and contributing to Lionistic causes. The convention will also present a Memorial Service for those Lions who have new horizons for work! Lion PDG Judy Kauffman will be in charge. Additionally, at our meeting it is custom to deliver business cards to the incoming COG officers.

In the realm of innovation and scientific advancement, LVG had one of its most productive years. With 16 peer reviewed publications and 17 presentations at scientific meetings, LVG further distinguished itself as a leader in the field of eye banking and corneal transplantation. DMEK, still a much smaller proportion of endothelial keratoplasty than DSAEK despite its demonstrable advantages, was made even more accessible to the community due to LVG's work. Marking the graft's orientation with a smaller F stamp was found to be equivalent in a clinical setting and superior in a laboratory setting versus the previously deployed S stamp. Additionally, our method of loading prestained DMEK tissue into a tube was awarded US Patent 10,041,865 B2 "Corneal Tissue Sample Assemblies and Related Methods of Use". This intellectual property has since been licensed to five more eye banks and several more are interested. Through this patent protection and licensing, LVG is able to recoup some of the investments made in bringing Patient Ready DMEKTM to the field as well as ensure that only those doing this work with the proper care and attention are providing these specialized grafts. Dr. Khoa Tran was the sole inventor named on the patent. He is quick to credit the rest of the LVG team for creating an environment where good ideas can flourish.

Publications highlighting advances in tissue evaluation as well as quality assurance (QA) were shared with the larger eye banking community. These publications underscore LVG's commitment to Stewardship, as the sometimes opposed forces of never wasting a donor's gift and never doing harm to a recipient require constant review and improvement. These publications promote advanced techniques in tissue evaluation that can make the subtle more obvious which is essential when evaluating corneas for appropriate use. Additionally, our QA Index may be the first ever on two fronts. There is literally no other paper on eye banking QA in peer reviewed literature that we are aware of AND there is no other paper that specifically tries to make complex audits into an easily communicated score that can assist staff, management, and Board members in understanding where an organization sits from a quality standpoint with one number.

And *finally* in the research realm, 2018 was the inaugural year for the EBAA High Impact Research Grant. For the first time ever, the EBAA Board selected a specific research topic and solicited "high impact" grant applicants to address the topic. LVG, with Khoa Tran, PhD as the Principal Investigator, submitted an application along with many other highly respected institutes. LVG was selected by the EBAA to address the stated research topic which is a testament to our current capabilities as well as the stellar collaborators we have at Johns Hopkins University to help complete the work.

Our Boston location completed its first full year of operation and processed 738 corneas for DSAEK and DMEK. Additionally, the Boston location provided many tissues for emergency surgery in the Boston area – becoming a resource to the community that would not be possible without a physical presence. Local surgeons in training programs used the space to practice surgery and hone their skills prior to using them on living patients – something that is an essential part of medical training. Boston had its first visit by the FDA and Kristin Mathes, Chief Quality and Regulatory Officer, immediately flew to Boston to ensure that the inspection process was smooth. It was.

While Boston was seeing a surge in activity, Portland was gearing up for a huge transition from long-time vendor Statline who has prescreened all referral calls in the Pacific Northwest Transplant Bank (PNTB) referral catchment area. The new project was named the Donor Referral Line (DRL) and required coordination with five partner donation agencies to streamline the referral process in Oregon, Idaho,

and SW Washington. PNTB, Community Tissue Services, Idaho Lions Eye Bank, SightLife and Lions VisionGift all partnered to shift referral calls from Colorado to LVG's location in Portland. This required the use of new referral database software, major changes to our work flow, and the addition of new staff. It was not an easy transition and we are sure to see further enhancements to this workflow throughout 2019.

By the numbers, in 2018 LVG provided 1727 tissues for transplant, 543 tissues for training, and 797 tissues for research. In addition, LVG provided 3723 shelf-stable sterile grafts for transplant. These tissues are sclera, pericardium and cornea and are typically used for emergency patch grafts and in glaucoma surgery. LVG also processed 1366 corneas for the advanced DMEK surgery and 441 corneas for DSAEK.

On December 14, 2018, after two years as Chairman, Bob Van Slyke officially turned the gavel over to our new Chairman, Susan Meikle Stoops. She will lead the organization from 2019-2020. Chairman Meikle Stoops brings an amazing perspective to the leadership of LVG. She is the wife of longtime Board member Jack Stoops who passed away suddenly several years prior. When Jack died, Susan went through the same donation process that many thousands before her have done. Susan promises to combine her experience as a donor wife with that of her professional career and personal integrity to the Chairman role in the coming years.

unanimously approved and moved out of committee in February by the Senate Education Committee.
The Bill has been referred to Ways & Means and likely will have a hearing sometime in May.

We had an excellent turnout for Lions Day at the Capitol on April 24th to demonstrate Lions support for this issue. We received great feedback from legislators on the impact that Lions are having with our vision screening program and everyone that Lions Club members met with expressed their appreciation for this important effort of advocating for children's vision health. 



MD36 Shares International President Yngvadottir's View on Environmental Projects

Report to the Council of Governors May 2, 2019 meeting in Seaside, OR

LIONS QUEST

PDG Jim Jaggers, Chair

- 1. Have made presentations in all four Districts this year.
- 2. LCIF Funding Grants have been changed. The Community grant is \$15,000 effective this year. District E has yet to use this grant which will cover all costs of a program, including student materials. There is no matching requirement. Lions Quest grants have been separated from the Core 4 grant. Matching requirements are still there, but Oregon has several sources to meet this requirement.
- 3. With three issues involving education in the state of Oregon, it' time for local Lions Clubs to take a very hard look at the Lions Quest program which can address both of these issues. In other states Lions Quest has addressed all three of the issues.
 - #1-- The first is high school graduation rates which have Oregon in 49 place of 50 states. For too many years Lions have joked about this, saying the counts are not accurate. Unfortunately, they are. Oregon's graduation rate is just at 80%, yet some of Oregon's schools are in the high 90s.
 - #2-- The second is the rise in suicide rates among Oregon students.

 Several TV stations around the state have developed a program covering this issue. It's not pleasant, but continues to grow and could put one of Lions Districts at the top of the list in North America.
 - #3-- The third is safety in the classroom---FOR TEACHERS. We are not talking just about high schools, but grades 5 on up.
- 4. In an effort to address these issues, I have put a proposal forward to the Council of Governors regarding Lions Quest. Just as each club, each district is eligible for a grant. Is this a direction we want to take?
