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SOARING BEYOND THE HORIZON AS "WE SERVE"

As we enter into the fall season, all of the DGs are busy making visitations in their respective districts. If you ask any past DG they will tell you that meeting the Lions club members at each of the clubs in their district is what makes their year so great. All of the Lions clubs throughout our multiple district are very active in their community and what they do in the community does have an impact on both the state and international Lions.

As we look beyond the horizon this year, we need to emphasize each of the 5 major categories on which we are working, but, in order to be effective, we must have members. Our membership has been declining. That needs to be turned around. All those local projects we do provide service to our communities and it takes members to do these projects. Experience shows that members become leaders when they work toward a goal.

When Lionism started some 100 years ago, it was comprised mostly of business men, (no women), but as time marched on other male members of the community joined. During those days, women had their own organization and most women were not in the work force outside their homes. Fraternal organizations were big and had many members, all of whom wanted to do service in their communities, found the time to do so and included many of their family members.

Over the years, things changed. Most homes started having both parents working; the children are into all kinds of sports and activities both in school and outside of school which parents attend, leaving very little time for community projects for any organization to which they belonged. There was even an era of time when community service was put on the back burner. It is great to see that women are now a part of Lionism and schools are requiring the students to do community service prior to graduation. It's great to see that the need for community service volunteer is now being recognized once again.

We do find now that in most of our clubs the average age is 60-70+. The 30-50 age group is pretty much non-existent, although we are starting to get the younger ages in as we bring in social media. That more "mature" group of the 60-80 year-olds is the basis of our clubs and it is important to put a lot of work into insuring that these members are retained. **But** It is also important that these members are ready to change into this new evolving society in which we live. Maybe these members aren't as active as they once were, but there is always a job in any project that they can fill and remain a viable member of this great organization.

So I challenge everyone to look beyond the horizon and utilize and retain the more mature members of your clubs. They need Lionism and Lionism needs them.

You, Me and the D!

Hello Everyone,

Welcome to my world! And welcome to my favorite season of the year, fall, which I'm sure it is for many of you. How can you not love fall with all of its brilliant colors and, best of all, the ending of the horrible fire season during which many people suffered great losses with diminished breathing being paramount, the effect of which could affect them for the rest of their lives. Following is a great article that if the subject matter is studied and absorbed carefully, can help you override many problems that arise. Good luck on your ability to do so.

Heed Your Heart Diabetes Can Strain Your Heart. Take Steps to Protect It.

If you have type 2 diabetes, you should know that your heart is at risk, too. About 68% of people over 65 who have diabetes will die from some form of heart disease, and another 16% will die from a stroke. That means you should worry about your ticker just as much as your blood sugar levels.

The connection between heart disease and diabetes is strong for two main reasons, says Stacey Rosen, MD, a cardiologist at Northwell Health in New York. For starters, chronic high blood sugar levels harms blood vessels and accelerates atherosclerosis. "Blood vessel damage is what leads to complications of diabetes, such as blindness and kidney failure, as well as heart disease," says Rosen, who's also the vice president of women's health, Katz Institute for Women's Health, at Northwell Health.

The second issue is that many risk factors for type 2 diabetes and heart disease overlap. Being overweight, having high blood pressure, having low HDL ("good") cholesterol, and not getting enough physical activity all increase the chances of developing both conditions.

Tipping the scales in your favor:

You can, however, take steps to protect your heart. Losing weight if you need to and maintaining a healthy body mass index (BMI) will help a lot. Even shedding 10 pounds can make a big difference for managing your blood sugar levels and reducing your risk of heart disease. Rosen recommends having a nutritionist or certified diabetes educator help you devise meal plans based on your needs and preferences.

Exercise is also extremely important for heart health and diabetes management. The American Heart Association recommends at least 150 minutes per week of moderate aerobic activity, plus strength training at least twice a week. But smaller amounts of exercise can add up over the course of the day or week, says Rosen. "You don't have to do everything perfectly; anything you do right counts," she says. A 15-minute walk after lunch is a great start; so is lifting "weights" using soda bottles or cans of veggies.

Also, your doctor may prescribe a statin, a type of medication designed to lower cholesterol. Most people with diabetes benefit from these drugs even if their cholesterol levels seem OK, says Rosen. That's because the diabetes-heart disease connection is so strong, and statins do more than just lower LDL ("bad") cholesterol levels – they also stabilize plaque in the blood vessels, so it's less likely to break off and lead to a heart attack or stroke. Your doctor can help you weigh the risks and benefits


Eugene Downtown Lions Club Annual Raffle



Eye Clinic Receives Uncommon Salute

Four Union County optometrists who are bringing the world into sharper focus for the less fortunate are winning international acclaim.

Spencer Luke and Dan Beckner of Apple Eye Care in Island City and Sam Kimball and David Glabe of La Grande Family Eye Care, all doctors of optometry, have received the Lions Club International's prestigious Centennial Presidential Award. The award is one of 250 being given out throughout the world by Lions Club International as part of its Centennial Celebration.

The honor recognizes Spencer Luke, Dan Beckner, Sam Kimball and David Glabe for founding the Community Eye Clinic based at the Center for Human Development. The doctors volunteer their time and services at the clinic, which opened in 2014 and provides free eye exams and eyeglasses for low-income individuals.

"Very, very few volunteer eye clinics like this one have been created" said Sharon Rollins of Tigard, a state Lions Clubs International official. Rollins said the Community Eye Clinic is the only one she knows of in Oregon run by health care professionals volunteering their time. "It is extremely inspiring," said Rollins, who recently traveled to La Grande to present the award along with Lions Club International officials Judith Poage of Hood River and Phyllis Carlin of Redmond.

The clinic has provided free exams to almost 450 individuals and about 400 pairs of free eyeglasses to adults since it opened. In the process, the doctors have helped save the sight of many. This means that over the last four years around 120 people with potentially blinding conditions, who may have otherwise skipped or put off eye care because they could not afford an eye exam, have been directed to eve care professionals.



The frames for the glasses given to Community Eye Clinic patients are donated by Marchon Eyewear, a New York-based manufacturer and distributor of eyewear. The lenses and lab work needed are paid for by Vision Service Plan, a vision health care company based in Rancho Cordova, California.

Oregon City Lions Club Prepares Sack Lunches for Homeless

At their meeting on September 5, the members of the Oregon City Lions Club prepared 50 sack lunches to be given to the homeless through The Fathers Heart Street Ministry (THF), a day shelter that provides 2 hot meals and a sack lunch to go every day, in addition to a whole host of other services.

- Free computer stations
- VASH program for homeless veterans

There are approximately 2,700 homeless individuals in Clackamas County and 277 homeless in Oregon City.

Rysdam Thanks Lions for Cleanup

An individual from Hood River is interested in donating antique logging equipment, which could be placed at the same site.
