At the end of August, we had our first District cabinet meeting. 12 clubs attended and five clubs sent their leaders/members. The meeting minutes have been distributed as well as our District goals. As a District we need members to step up and fill out our committees. This means chairpersons as well as members. If you have a passion, please let us know and our District will be better for it.

If you have reviewed our District goals, you will notice that over the last 20 years on average we lost 40 members and approximately one club a year. Last year was the first year since, 2009-2010 (+49) that we have had net member growth (+5). In fact, with all our efforts, our District improved all metrics over the previous year. This is a journey, we are at the beginning of it and with a lot of hard work, innovation and focus we can put our District back on the path of growth.

During my DG Visit to the Gardiner-Reedsport Club I brought them 10 new member packets. They currently have 8 new members signed up and a pathway to an additional two. When asked why their club is exploding, the response I got was they have members talking up their club wherever they go in their community, others asking their friends, neighbors and associates to join their club and inviting folks to join them at their service events. They represent one club in our District, with new/old leaders, that is finding a way to growth and expanding the service that they provide to their communities.

Your club may have received your LCIF Empowering Service collection jar, if not contact your Zone Chairperson. To meet our goal of 250,000 nickels each of our 700 members needs to collect only 357 nickels or \$17.86 this year. We made it half-way to our goal last year, let's challenge ourselves to reach our goal this year.

I now have 17 club visits scheduled with only 12 to go. I will be reaching out to get the remaining clubs scheduled and with your help should make my goal of all visits this year. I leave in a few more days to attend the annual Lions USA/Canada Forum in Calgary where I hope to connect with new Lions, visit with our convention ID speaker, meet old acquaintances, and continue to learn.

We recently got an update from Iraq, where tissue LVG had supplied to EyeLife International (based in Baltimore) was utilized at the Baghdad Teaching Hospital by both a local surgeon and a member of a visiting international team. The two performed surgeries together and according to the information shared, "provided treatment services for complex medical conditions that are difficult to perform inside Iraq and to find treatment opportunities that are not currently available in our country".

We're both grateful to have played a part in this work, as well as for the recovered donor tissue that allows for this work to take place.

At LVG, we believe that 'Everyone Has a Fundamental Right to See!', and we will continue to make sure that all recovered corneal tissue finds a home, whether placed within the U.S. for either transplant or research/training, or somewhere around the world where there is a need.



#### Lions Boot Up to Service at District G's Cabinet Meeting

"Lions Boot Up to Service" is the theme for District G's Governor, Cheri Jackson. DG Jackson stated the motto could be interpreted several ways, but Cheri is calling for increased membership leading to increased service for communities. The DG asked that members look up the abundance of information on the Lions' website. The use of technology will encourage younger people to consider joining Lions.

DG Cheri listed the cabinet and convention meeting dates as November 13<sup>th</sup> (Rufus), February 5<sup>th</sup> (Rufus), and District G's convention at Wild Horse. That date will be distributed to members.

PDG Kathy Oliver emphasized the need to find members willing to serve the various district offices. She also emphasized the need for new members, the need to find individuals who would be willing to fill the district offices, and the need to be better prepared for emergencies across the state. PDG Kathy encouraged leaders to develop an emergency plan. Finding new clubs was high on the list presented by PDG Kathy.

PCC Paul Zastrow gave reports on Canine Service, Constitution and Bylaws, Finance and Budget, Oregon Lions Sight and Hearing Foundation, and Youth Exchange. Under his Canine Services report PCC Paul stated that it costs upwards of \$25,000 to raise, train and place the animals. Funding is crucial so Lions are encouraged to check the websites and contribute as individuals or as clubs. Under the Constitution and Bylaws report that PCC Paul presented, he explained there is a need to update the new governing documents. We have time for the February updates with new items from LCI. PCC Zastrow stated he is working on collecting the first half dues from clubs. He reminded the Cabinet members that clubs should donate to the Melvin Jones and Norm Ross fellows of \$2 per member for both awards. The donation is designed for smaller clubs to enable them to provide member recognition. A reminder was given that District G currently has Lucinda Awbrey, Mike Kilkinney and Russ Chase as representatives of OLSHF's Foundation, but we have more openings to fill. Lions Clubs International Foundation ("LCIF") is our international arm for fundraising and expending monies where the need is greatest! The Lions Youth Exchange programs are back and happening. This year is going to be the year of transition from being closed due to COVID and the pandemic of the century to a somewhat limited schedule. For more information, Lion PCC Paul requested that he be contacted regarding acquiring an exchange student or serving as a host family.

PDG Gary Mose reported that the MD36 Pediatric Cancer committee met by ZOOM on August 1. The committee is in the preliminary stages of planning projects for the districts. The committee is looking for projects that all districts can work together.

PDG Gerald Hopkins reported on the upcoming Sunday ZOOM meeting regarding a Public Relations grant for the Multiple District. The committee is looking at the purchase of yard signs, car magnet bumper stickers, and coffee cup sleeves through a \$15,000 grant. The items would be distributed equally among the four districts who would be asked to pay 10% of the \$15,000 grant. The Board was very favorable to the request.







# **Eugene Bethel Lions Tour the Oregon Air and Space Museum in Eugene**

On July 27, several members of the Eugene Bethel Lions toured the Oregon Air and Space Museum located at the Eugene Airport. Long-time Bethel Lion Dale Roxberg conducted the tour. Lion Dale has volunteered since 1996. He is the Museum's Display Coordinator.

The Oregon Air and Space Museum was conceived by the 4-5 founding fathers in 1988. After developing a project analysis, they drew up plans in 1989. The Museum opened to the public in 1991. Currently the museum is contained in 2 buildings at 90377 Boeing Dr in Eugene. Rated as one of the major sights to see in Eugene.

The museum is a combination of one of the best 1/77 scale models collection of over 1,000 models donated by Dave Galbrith. Dave Lopez of NASA in Washington DC has visited the museum several times and commented on the various displays. The museum also has an A4 Sky Hawk, A6 Intruder, and a T34 Trainer on loan from the US Navy in Pensacola Florida. Engines displayed were donated by Marine Major General Marion Carl. General Carl, a 1937 graduate of Oregon State University, went on to become a World War II ace shooting down 18 enemy aircraft. He was a record-setting test pilot. The museum also had a collection of Pan Am airlines memorabilia including a model that was hanging in the San Francisco Concourse.



Lion Dale wanted to make sure that I indicate that the museum is always looking for volunteers. The museum is open to the public on Thursday through Saturday, 12 – 4pm. Admission is \$7 for adults, Seniors (62 over) \$6, Ages (6-17) \$3 and Ages 5 under free.


# Elgin Lions Collect School Supplies for School

After Bottger's report, the Lions voted to purchase \$250 of backpacks for those in need at the school.






