1. Call to Order: CC, Steve Oliver called the Council of Governors mtg. to order on March 24, 2017 at 1:34 pm. The meeting was held at Red Lion, in Pendleton, OR.

Invocation given by PCC Bob Guerrant.

The Pledge of Allegiance started by CC Steve Oliver.

 - a. As PCC Chuck LaTourrette was not present, DG Carol Brink will present him with a letter and Certificate of Appreciation from Immediate Past International President Yamada when she sees him.
 - b. MD36 Co-Chair Sheri Young of the Alert Team spoke about Oregon VOAD (Volunteer Organizations Active in Disaster) also known as ORVOAD. Oregon Lions can capture greater respect from government and other experienced volunteer non-profits if we join ORVOAD as a state-wide organization, not just as a sub-region. In the last 10 years, internationally, LCIF has donated over 100 million dollars to disaster relief around the world. We do so much at an international level, locally, etc. We want to bring up preparedness at local, state and international levels. Oregon's Dept. of FEMA looks to VOAD. Checking houses, helping people who need to be fed in crisis, etc. It opens us up to training. This is an area she feels strongly can bring in younger people who want to help. Difference in fees is \$50 per year as a sub-district. Or \$75/annually for our entire multiple district. She can get the difference covered if that is an issue. She wants us to stake our claim as a non-denominational group to be effective and a unique organization to be professional and perform effective CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) teams. Was decided to put on old business and discuss and vote on at Council of Governor meeting on August 19, 2017, Rockaway. Will need to be renewed annually for each Council to consider. Don Markle added that Manzanita has a well-established CERT team in place. They appreciated Lions wanting to help, but they have a great well-trained team in place.

Show up on sunny days, think about timing of when you go to visit (not over spring break..).. she is available to help to set up new clubs.

Membership continues to decline which is still having an impact on declining revenues which in turn is affecting our cash flow. All of you have received statements through May 2017.



Council of Governors District 36-O May 2017

Fellow Lions I going to start with Zone 1 on the coast and you have 86 miles from Astoria to Cloverdale which is a two hour trip without traffic. The zone has a net gain of +5for the year thanks to the Rockaway Lions in starting their new branch club, the Rockaway Knights Lions Club. Rockaway has become the largest club in the district with 71 members and the only Leos club in the district, the Neah-Kah-Nie Leos. With Seaside Lions charter pull by LCI, the Astoria Lions is rushing in to try to start a branch club instead in Seaside and have it up and running sometime in the next year. I should mention Garibaldi Lions stumbled a little this year but some quick action by Lion Zone Chair Ray Herrington and other Rockaway Lions saved the club and hopefully back onto a sustainable path. Next step on Zone 1s list is to try to start a branch club in Tillamook, the Rockaway Lions has been helping out with a lot of eyeglasses there and their efforts have been noticed.

Zone 2 with 6 clubs which includes my club of Amity, still hanging in there with 10 members. The McMinnville Lions and the Vernonia Lions are at 41 Members each. McMinnville has been slowly losing members were Vernonia has been growing. Both clubs are very active in their areas. Carlton/Yamhill with 17 members has some issues with their membership not wanting to step up into any of the club officer's positions. They finally returned one of my calls and I'll be visiting them on the 24th of the month, ask PDG Red about his visit as DG. Forest Grove Lions Club is very active and works closely with Pacific University School of Optometry. Forest Grove Lions Club also sponsors the Eden Acres Branch Lions Club. Last September I was able to get ahold of Lion Becky Clark of the Banks Lions Club and she told me that they had only five members and that they were talking of turning in their charter. Now I know they have 11 members and have not turned in their charter.

Zone 3 has the Portland Downtown Lions Club with 37 members and for the past few years the office of club President would change hands after 3, 4 or 6 months. But next year they'll have a full time President. The next club in this zone is our OLS&HF, Portland Legacy Lions Club with 10 members and they are unique, they are responsible for making sure that our foundation run's as well as it does and fallow the wishes of the Lions of MD 36. Portland Bentham Lions has 23 members and this is our next District Governors home club. St. Helens with 38 members is in this Zone along with their branch club French Prairie Lions. PDG Hank Calhoun and the St Helens Lions worked hard to keep the Scappoose Lions in the fold, LCI pulled their charter the same time that they pull Seaside and Gales Creek Camp. It was the loss of Gales Creek Camp Lions 20 members that set our district membership back.

Zone 4 has the Beaverton Lions Club with 28 members and they always have something in the works to keep active, you should try their mystery dinner sometime. Cedar Hills Sunset Lions with 19 members and 6 years old is always on the look for activities to do. They also sponsor the University of Portland Campus Branch Club. Hillsboro Lions is going on to 80 years next year and they have 5 members that wants to keep the club alive and they have asked for help in doing that. King City Lions Club is the largest in this zone with 61 members and it's a club that is always looking outside the box for activities to do. Portland Metro Lions Club with 9 members is our district Korean Lions Club that meets at noon at the New Seoul Garden Restaurant in Beaverton. If you visit they do understand and speak in English but they talk amongst themselves in Korean. The food is authentic Korean.

We now move to Zone 5 which is the far east side of the district and we'll start with the Estacada Lions Club with 17 members and they just had their 50th anniversary this past December and they have a net gain of 6 new members this year. I was told that not too long ago they were down to just 3 members with one saying they should throw in the towel. Look at them today. Next are the two Gresham Clubs. We have the Gresham (Super) Supper Lions Club and the Gresham Breakfast Lions Club. The Supper Club has 15 members and Breakfast Club has 51 members, both are hardworking active club. Troutdale Lions Club has 5 members and has asked for help. I have not visited this club yet but I was told to just go without announcement. The Sandy Lions Club has 9 members and are doing what they can to bring in more members. For the past two years they've had a Lions Peace Poster entry. Last of the clubs in this zone is not exactly on Mount Hood but it does come close. The Mount Hood Lions Club has 66 members and their own clubhouse. When talking to 1st VDGE Dan Wolf about his club it'll take an hour to run off everything they do.

Zone 6 makes up the Eastside of downtown Portland. Portland Columbia with 11 members, meet at the Spare Room Restaurant and Bingo Hall. Every Monday night is Bingo and it's in the Clubs Charter with LCI. Every year the Bingo brings in \$15,000 to \$20,000. Portland Hollywood Lions Club has 40 members and this club had to find a new place to meet because the Rhinelander closed down. I have not received an official notice on where they move to as of yet. Portland Lloyd Lions Club has 15 Members which I haven't visited yet. This club is the club that took LCI to court to allow women to become members of Lions Clubs not just Lioness. Thank you Portland Lloyd Lions. Portland Oaks Bottom Lions Club with 35 members the club that's the biggest supporter of the Mexico Vision Clinic Trip every year. Oregon Lions has reached across International borders to truly help those in need. Portland Parkrose Lions Club has 9 Members and I have not yet visited this club.

Zone 7 and I'll start with Beavercreek Lions Club another club that meets in the morning but on a Saturday has 32 Members. I attended the clubs Auction, Silent Auction and Plant sale before I officially visited the club. Canby Lions Club has 20 Members and I should be able to

visit them this month. Milwaukie Lions Club has 22 Members and I never seem to be there when Dennis is there except at the Milwaukie Golf Tournament to give support and have fun. Oregon City Lions Club is down from 22 to 13 Members. West Linn Lions Club has 57 Members and they have activities all over the place from Lake Oswego to the Capital Building in Salem. West Linn Riverview Lions Club has 30 Members and I just visited them where I had a fantastic potluck dinner.

Zone 8 has Lake Grove Lions club with 13 Members and a member that was trying to shut it down and the club president said not without approval of the members. They are still with us and have a new outlook in their membership. Lake Oswego Lions Club with 44 Members and if you want to see energy go to their pancake breakfast feed on the Fourth of July. The Mighty Tualatin Lions Club has 7 Members and I'm not sure why I have not visited them yet. Wilsonville Lions Club has 12 Members and was on suspension but payment was made on May 1st, 2017.

Clubs

Cancelled Clubs:

Lebanon - The year started with this club being a club in trouble. It had been 10 months since a MMR had been filed. There had not been an officer report in the last year, and 24 months since an activity report had been filed. The district governor and the club president met and agreed that the club would meet to discuss closing the club. On 9/21/16 the club met and voted to disband. With eight members in attendance five voted yes, with three abstaining. On 10/20/16 the club was placed on status quo with an unpaid dues of \$322.50. At this point the district governor put the First Vice District Governor, Tom Hilgers in charge of closing the club. Lack of communication became readily apparent by all parties, but the club did pay their dues by 12/29/16. On April 13, 2017 the First Vice District Governor sent mail requesting that if the club is closing its doors that the accounts be closed and the remaining monies be put to work. To date we have not received any decision and the vice district governor has forwarded the eyeglass applications on to the club. At this date, the issues are not resolved.

Scio - The Scio club voted to close its doors. The governor and vice governor met with the club. The club wanted to give out one last scholarship and then the remaining monies will be distributed and used for eyeglasses. At this date the Christmas decorations (on the street poles) will go to another club in Scio and remaining property has been picked up and will be distributed to other clubs or returned to the district office.

Blue McKenzie - This club was put on status quo in November, 2016. And was cancelled on 12/29/16. Second Vice District Governor Dale Bachman is familiar with this club and agreed to work with the remaining three members to re-activate the club. Dues owed and reactivation forms are filled out, however the bank account has a problem so the forms and payment have not been filed. Again, communication with the club has not been good, with club president in Alaska. We continue to work to rebuild this club.

New Clubs:

Campus Clubs: Corvallis Campus Club has 12 members and is becoming a branch club of Corvallis Lions Club... U of O club has seven members and is becoming a branch club of Eugene Downtown. Western Oregon Campus Club has given no report as of this date. By becoming branch clubs, the university clubs can plan summer vacation and plan for Fall semester.

Other new clubs: As soon as LCI receives the paperwork on the campus branch clubs we will begin work on Drain/Yoncalla. This will be started in this governor's year, but will be completed in the next year.

Fund Raisers/Projects: Many fund raisers and service projects have been going on all year. Many Centennial projects have been completed and many still happening. The posters that have been made are being put to good use. Many clubs are giving out scholarships. Those students receiving scholarships will be contacted about joining a campus club if attending a university.

Clubs in Trouble: This governor considers any club that has dropped under 10 is a club that needs to be watched. True, many small clubs do great work, but factors that change the membership of the club need to be watched. Those clubs are Lincoln City, Pacific Sea, Newport and Lakeside. The coast clubs met recently to discuss their positions and possible solutions for keeping their individual charters, but work together on projects. More to come on this as they meet again in August.

What we did well:

- formed three branch campus clubs
- Put on the Second Women's Symposium
- Continue with Centennial projects
- The wristband project was a huge success in our district.
- The Eclipse Glasses Project is huge with projected 10,000 glasses to be sold by clubs. At this date we are over 3,000. If we do in fact sell 10,000 that will mean \$5,000 for Clubs and \$2,500 for the Yachats and Central Club (minus expenses) for managing the project.

Conclusion: The majority of clubs in District R are doing fine. All clubs are experiencing the same drop in membership due to circumstances that are beyond our control.

This has been a great year and this district governor learned a lot, had a lot of fun, and will continue to work to serve as a Lion.

CLUB VISITATIONS: I have visited 35 out of 36 clubs, and still trying to catch up with Southern Oregon Drifting. **CLUB REBUILDING:** Cave Junction is down to 4 members but the good news is they are adding a new member and will soon be a club of 5. They are enthusiastic and getting ready for their classic car show. PDG Wes King is their Guiding Lion and continues to work with them. **Crescent/Gilchrist** is 4 years old and has been having administrative trouble. They were very close to turning in their charter. They couldn't get any new officers and were struggling with future plans. There was a Lion from another District attending their meetings and stirring the pot by encouraging Crescent/Gilchrist Lions to close down their club and join them in their district. This caused controversy among members. The outcome for the club is positive thanks to the President Gary Neville, PDG Rennie Cleland and support of my DG team. Gary will continue on as president one more year and has found a Vice President to replace him the following year. They still need a Secretary but a volunteer will take meeting notes until they find one. The good news is the club will go forward in July with 15 members.

DOGS FOR DEAF: Grant application was presented May 9-11 at the LCIF Board of Trustees Meeting. PDG Wes King and I are hopeful regarding DFD getting the \$85,000 matching grant. We appreciate state wide clubs donations. DFD are also going to be presenters at the upcoming USA/Canada Forum in September.

36E CONVENTION: was March 24, 25 in Klamath Falls and we were excited to have 95 Lions there. Because of the snow we weren't sure how many would come. We were pleased to have PID Haynes Townsend as our guest speaker. He is LCI's endorsed candidate for 3rd Intl. Vice President. Gail Black organized Officer and Zone Training and as a bonus Carrie Bartley volunteered, at the last minute, to talk about Public Relations. Our income from quilt raffle, basket raffle, silent auction and convention booklet was almost \$3000. What is left after convention expenses will be transferred to our Leadership Training account for future scholarships.

NORTHWEST LIONS LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE: there were 9 attendees from all areas of 36E (including Gail Black who was a presenter). We were able to sponsor Lions using our Leadership Training fund (\$150 per Lion) for a total of \$1350. Some clubs paid the remaining \$140 for their attendees.

USA/CANADA FORUM in SEPT: I am pleased that there are thirteen 36E Lion volunteers signed up to assist at the USA/Canada Forum in Portland. I will keep asking; hopefully we can get more 36E Lions to help.

LEOS CLUB: Sutherlin Club is working on chartering Leos club but the couple that volunteered to be the Lion liaisons backed out, good news is 2 other Lions have stepped forward. We will work on it again in the fall.

SUMMARY: I have enjoyed my year as District Governor, especially the club visits. It was amazing to me to see how many **small clubs** with 15 members or less in my district are staying healthy. They continue to do great things in their communities with only a few Lions. They do this by supporting each other, not taking on more projects than they can handle and focusing on "Just Ask 1". They have a "Heart of the Lion" and are concerned that adults and youth in their area won't get the help they need if they close their doors. I didn't add any new clubs this year but thanks to my Guiding Lions and District Governor's team we were able to keep the clubs who were struggling moving forward in a positive direction. My focus this year has been "retention" I have emphasized it in my monthly Oregon Lion magazine articles and the E-COM newsletter. My goal was to inform clubs in my district of what it takes to retain their Lions through Helping others, Encouraging one another, having an Attitude that is positive for Success, Respecting each other's differences and working together as a Team. Dogs for the Deaf received a grant to expand their facility through the efforts of PDG Wes and support of Lions throughout the state. 36E clubs had a successful year due to perseverance and a Lion heart.

Oregon Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation Council of Governor's Report Pendleton, OR – May 18th, 2017

- OLSHF's Mobile Health Screening Program (MHSP) is nearing completion of the 2016-17 school year and is on track to conduct over 600 school vision screening events and over 175,000 students screened for vision health issues. Our referral rate to date is 10.5%, we will refer approximately 18,500 students for eye examinations.
- The Foundation has been part of the process of introducing legislation in January to the Oregon legislature to provide state funding for school districts to provide vision screening in Oregon schools. If passed, the Foundation and Lions in MD 36 will be able to continue to screen the number of students we currently screen. When HB 3000 was passed back in 2013, it envisioned a public=private partnership where the state would provide resources and nonprofits like OLSHF would provide equipment and volunteers to provide critical vision screenings. Lions have held up our end of the bargain and we now are asking the State of Oregon to fulfill their obligation.

This legislative effort has already begun, as we are meeting with key legislators and influential groups such as the Oregon Education Association. All MD 36 Lions in Oregon will be invited and encouraged to support this effort once a Bill number has been assigned to the legislation.

We hope that you all will join us at this coming Thursday, May 24th for "Lions Day at the Capitol" in Salem, where we will celebrate the work of Lions in Oregon and meet with our state legislators to urge them to support this important legislation.

• When the Foundation received funds from LCIF to develop our Lions Eyeglass Assistance Program (LEAP) Optical Lab almost two years ago, the grant from LCIF also included funds to remodel a portion of the OLSHF offices to develop a retail optical shop. Using these funds, the Foundation will soon open "Eye Promise", a retail shop where customers can purchase high quality eyeglasses for an affordable price. Every dollar of profit from Eye Promise will support the charitable efforts of the LEAP Lab.

OLSHF Staff have brought Eye Promise here to Pendleton for MD-36 Convention by providing a Trunk Show for interested Lions that would like to purchase new eyeglasses. Every dollar that Eye Promise generates will support the charitable LEAP program, and will help us continue to help people in need with new eyeglasses.

- The LEAP Lab has now manufactured over 2,000 pair of new eyeglasses for people in need that were sponsored by MD-36 Lions Clubs in the past year. We now have over 50 Lions Clubs and over 50 local vision providers as part of the LEAP Network. As Governors, we ask that you promote this opportunity for Lions Clubs to save money every time they help someone in need with a new pair of eyeglasses.
- The Foundation excited to induct our newest class members into the OLSHF Hall of Fame tomorrow night after the District Dinners. Being inducted are Lions Art Rotter (posthumously) of the Yachats and Jefferson Lions, Fred McNaughton of the Milwaukie Lions, and Brian Rangitsch of the Salem Downtwon Lions. We hope to see you all there!

Lions Leah and Glynis,

Charlene Larsen (copied here) and I have been Lion Alert Co-chairs for MD 36-O since 2010-11.

Both of us have emergency and disaster response experience and training prior to and beyond our Lion Alert roles and in addition to our Lion roles.

As such we both (1) recognize the particular and valuable role Lions (through their values and organizational structure) can play in generating effective community and regional/state response to hazards occurring in our communities, sub regions and state, (2) know development of effective club/community response can best occur utilizing government and other non-profit training programs, and (3) work with those agencies through Oregon VOAD (Volunteer Organizations Active in Disaster.)

Lion membership in ORVOAD demonstrates to Oregon Emergency Management (OEM), associated government jurisdictions and agencies, and other established VOADs (such as but not limited to Red Cross, Salvation Army, Southern Baptists, Catholic Relief Services and Lutheran Disaster Response) that Oregon Lions are committed to preparing for and responding to hazards and disasters in our communities through knowing and using the best training and organizational techniques available. As Lions, we will match those to Lion Club resources, and integrate with government and other non-profit humanitarian responder organizations.

This is entirely consistent with historical local and regional response by Oregon Lions Clubs (such as the 2007 and 2012 Vernonia, Tillamook and north Oregon coast floods) and LCIF purposes identifying Disaster Response as among the 4 key international programs.

MD 36-O Lions voted to join ORVOAD in 2014. Other MD 36 Alert chairs have been aware of the ORVOAD role and - as with Susan Gartland, 36-R- attended ORVOAD and headed other county volunteer efforts to unite government and non-profit organization efforts in disaster preparation, damage mitigation and response.

Oregon Lions can capture greater respect from government and other experienced volunteer non-profits if we join ORVOAD as a state-wide organization, not just as a sub-region.

We would appreciate this topic being on the agenda of the Council of Governors at the May 18 meeting in Pendleton.

MD 36-O Alert Team Report MD 36 Council of Governors and State Convention Pendleton May 18-20 2017

For the Alert Program, our March report remains a valid overview, with the confirmation that (as anticipated) Sheri attended the Oregon Emergency Preparedness Workshop sponsored by the Oregon Emergency Managers and Oregon Health Authority April 10-14, and Charlene attended the Mountain West VOAD (Volunteer Organizations Active in Disaster) conference April 23 to April 30.

Both events provided extensive information, training and contact with government and non-profit sectors active and responsible for emergency and disaster response.

We are concerned with (at the least) (1) knowing who does or is responsible for what in the various stages of preparing for and responding to natural and/or anticipated hazards and emergencies (2) what the known gaps are (3) establishing credibility for Lions and volunteer organizations in filling those needs, (4) how to build effective community organizations and (5) effective training and communication techniques.

Post conferencing, we must assimilate the "take-home" from the wide range of topics covered, and then how we can use that to build Oregon Lions.

We are heartened to know the Council of Governors will consider bringing MD-36 into Oregon VOAD as a whole. Within Oregon VOAD this builds Lions credibility and as a VOAD member, we will have greater credibility with Oregon Emergency Management and FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency) which "credentials" volunteer response organizations through NVOAD (National Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters.) We also believe building preparation for disaster response within local communities will strengthen Lions Clubs credibility and community roles.

We will continue to try to upgrade our primary "do prepare to survive" trainings, and hope to prepare more Lions to give their own in club and community trainings in personal and family preparation. This is only the first step. We also wish to move forward with creating a register of interested and committed Lions who will build community teams which can enhance their community and Lions role in county and regional response. This can (for example) include integrating otherwise isolated (disaster trained) health professionals, canine search and rescue teams, and/or Ham radio operators.

Through the ORVOAD connection we are introduced to so many possibilities, we are still trying to assess what constellations of skills and needs are the best fit for Lions. We expect this will vary by club and locality, but we will only learn that through a good system of communication with the clubs. We hope to use the Pendleton convention to connect with other MD-36 Alert chairs and interested Lions to develop those foci and the next steps for building a statewide team.

We are also aware we should be coordinating with Lions Alert Chairs in other states. LCI initiated such contacts in 2014. It all takes thought and time.

- 5. Scouting seems to be in a growing stage. My home club will be sponsoring a new Boy Scout Troop.
- 6. The goal for Youth Exchange is to spread the program to all Districts next year.

- 1. The Hood River Eyeopeners has filed the final report with LCIF for the \$10,000 Community Partnership Grant it received for the Hood River School District. A big thanks goes to Trudy Tallman for her extensive work with the Grant over this fiscal year. She reports that all but around \$50.00 was used for training and student materials in Hood River.
- 2. The Forest Grove Lions are in their second year of a LCIF Core 4 \$33,000 grant used in the Forest Grove and Hillsboro School Districts. This grant provides funds for a private group to assist children in those school districts.
- 3. Still looking for a school district/private group and local Lions Club in District E to take advantage of the \$10,000 Community Partnership Grant. Have had interest from two school districts, but no formal applications.
- 4. To date, Districts O, R and G have made use of the Community Partnership Grants of \$10,000. These grants do not need local matching funds and can be used only once by the District.
- 5. District O is in the second year of the LCIF Core 4 Grant in support of Lions Quest. Core 4 Grants require a 25% local match. There are several endowments around Oregon that have expressed interest in helping raise the local match funds.
- 6. Looking ahead----Districts R and G are eligible immediately to file a Core 4 Grant Application. District E still has the opportunity for the \$10,000 Community Partnership Grant. District O can begin to work on a new Core 4 Grant application and file it as soon as Forest Grove has filed its final report during the next fiscal year. Remember, Core 4 grants can be given for much more than the \$10,000.

- 1. History Lesson---The Lions of Oregon were one of the groups that started this program. SMART is a program that brings adults into the schools to read with early elementary students. The goal is to assist students in improving their reading skills.
- 2. I am currently working with the SMART offices around the state to identify each school district using the SMART program. This list will be published in a later edition of the Oregon Lion so local Lions Clubs have the opportunity to become involved in the program.
- 3. As a sidelight, local Lions Clubs can easily provide free reading books to local schools. Sign up for Scholastic Books FACES program. This is free and provides clubs the opportunity to purchase books at 10-25 cents on the dollar. I am aware of several clubs in Districts O and R who are doing this.
